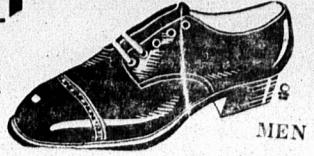

Trinity United Church Opens New Field of Medical Treatment

ROCHESTER, N. Y., Oct. 26—Creation of dozens of new radioactive elements and compounds for the treatment of cancer and many other diseases was announced today before the National Academy of Sciences.

This development, which promises to "break the market" on radium and make the diagnosis and treatment of human disease easier and quicker than ever before, was discussed by Dr. L. A. Dubridge of the University of Rochester and Nobel Prize winner Dr. Ernest O. Lawrence of the University of California.

The new substances are produced by subjecting them to the intense radiations of neutrons, deuterons, protons and other particles of matter. These powerful radiations are created by the cyclotron, a whirling machine which "kicks" the particles around and around until they attain energies of millions of volts.

"We are now able to make any element radioactive by treating it with these radiations," Dr. Lawrence declared in an interview following his paper describing an improved type of cyclotron. "This is opening up a whole new field of medical treatment, comparable to the discovery of X-rays and radium almost a half century ago."

NORTH BEDEQUE Community Club met on Monday evening. Vice-Principal Blanchard of P.W. C. lectured on Provincial Progress and Problems. He pictured in detail the days when the Island was self-sufficient, with many local industries supplying local needs, employing all its own people, with an increasing population till about 1890, largely independent of the outside world. Since then came the revolution in mechanized industry and mass production, wiping out the small local industries, driving the surplus population to the big centres, making us dependent on these outside industries for our machinery and manufactured commodities, crippling the unorganized farmers in competition with these highly organized groups, and lessening his home market since nearly half our native population increase has left us in those years. He suggested that change is long overdue, beginning with our educational system, as basic to every other helpful change, and reaching out especially into our fundamental occupation of agriculture. He was followed briefly by Mr. Gordon Wright, in charge of the cow-testing work of the agricultural dept., who indicated how every increase in butter-fat productivity means a much larger proportionate profit, since there is a fixed sum necessary for ordinary maintenance anyway. Nearly all above that is clear gain. The usual program of community singing was presented, with recitations by Betty Barwise, Margaret McMurdo, Mrs. Ralph McCaul, and Catherine Gaudet, who also gave a solo. The children joined in a musical game, "London Bridge". Arrangements were made for relief contribution to the west, Messrs. Dingwell and Scott McMurdo to canvass North Bedeque, and Mr. Frank Jardine Wilnot Valley.
