

CONSULTING ROOM ON WHEELS



FOR service in Ontario east of Ottawa and throughout Quebec and the Maritimes, the Canadian National Railways have just built a new medical car, similar to those which have already proved their usefulness in the rest of Ontario and in the western provinces. Well-equipped, compact, as white and shining as a hospital, it will travel from place to place for the benefit of engineers, firemen and trainmen who cannot conveniently go to clinics for their periodic physical examinations. It has a waiting room at one end and at the other the doctor's quarters, including a bedroom, shower bath, kitchen and living room.

The car, which will go out on the line about November 15, is in charge of Dr. Louis Philippe Robert, graduate of the University of Montreal and holder of the Certificate of Public Health awarded by Johns Hopkins University. He was medical examiner and epidemiologist of the City Health Department, Montreal, for seven years.

In the photograph, Dr. Robert is shown making a blood pressure test. Henry Clarke, working on the roof of a coach in the Canadian National Point St. Charles Shops, where the car was built, climbed down and laid aside his hammer long enough to pose as a patient.

Alberta And Quebec In Hog Marketings

Hog marketings for the month of September, 1937, were about 5,000 hogs per week below the marketings for the corresponding month in 1936. A sharp reduction occurred in the three Prairie Provinces where only 80,435 were marketed as compared with 114,768 in the province of Ontario. Notwithstanding reduced marketings, the province of Alberta recorded a new high in quality, 29.2 per cent select.

Marketings in the province of Saskatchewan were about the same in September, 1937, as in the corresponding month of 1936, but the quality reflected rough conditions and a tendency to liquidate. Only 31.5 per cent were in the two top grades and 40 per cent were light. The quality of hog marketings in the province of Manitoba showed normal improvement. In the past, the province of Quebec has ranked fifth in the volume of hogs marketed, but during the month of September of this year moved up to second place, being exceeded only by the province of Ontario.

FINANCIAL NEWS BRIEFS

(Received over Pitfield and Co's Private Wire)

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The London market this morning is steady and also the Amsterdam market. The price of copper is also firmer in London. The President conferred with economists yesterday. Apparently, some of them are recommending "pump priming" again. In this connection it is interesting to note that Morgenthau said he will declare his position on "pump priming" in his speech to be made Wednesday night in New York. Chairman Douglas, of S. E. C., was cornered by reporters yesterday and when asked about the stock market said a comprehensive study was being made and that it may result in a little more or a little less regulation. Congress will convene next Monday. The president's meetings today include Columbia Carbon, Congoleum, International Paper Pfd., Libby Owens, Ford and Western Auto Supply.

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The market took early selling of yesterday very well and although some new lows were registered the list acted very differently from what it did during the big selling movement of last month. What is of greater importance was the rally that took scores of stocks above last week's closing prices and the end was on a strong note. We regard prospects favorable for a much better rally this week. Heretofore when we have had activity and sharply declining prices of a Monday we have seen stocks much lower later but when we have started the week as we did yesterday almost invariably we have seen a very sharper rebound. Steel is still some nine points below where it was at the close of the week before last. Very good buying took place in steel early yesterday and it may easily do sixty or so again even on a fair rally. Chrysler is down about eight points from the closing levels of a week ago Saturday and with a \$3 dividend coming off this week it should rebound very sharply. It also was well bought early yesterday as was General Motors. The utilities did nobly and suggest something like a major advance shortly. Electric Bond and Share led out in the lower court in its efforts to volunteer the Government's listing prospects, but EBS held steady and as the case will doubtless be appealed to the Supreme Court we regard EBS as a great bargain for the pull. Continue to greatly favor the Elec. Fr. and Am. Fr. and Lite groups and also Stone and Webster, North American, United Gas, American Gas and Elec., Amer Waterworks among other utilities. We like aircraft right along. Consider Paramount very cheap stock. Philip Morris jumps up again shortly. We suggest a very sharp advance now.

Grain Prices

WINNIPEG, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Wheat futures on Winnipeg grain exchange staged the first sharp comeback of this month's trading today, closing 2-1-8 to 1-3-8 cents higher.

Good export demand, strength at Liverpool, higher security markets and bulge in cash wheat prices turned nervous sentiment of the past week into a bull movement. At the close November sold at \$1.13 3-4, December \$1.09 5-8, May \$1.07 3-8 and July \$1.02 1-8. Below-the-dollar wheat disappeared with the flow of commission house orders pouring into the pit from the start. July slumped to 97 5-8 cents before mid-session yesterday. Today's rally sent the price to \$1.03. Scarcity of offerings contributed to strength in cash wheat prices. No. 1 and 2 northern closed one cent higher, 22 and 18 cents above the November future, respectively. Speculative and export demand sent rye futures 1-7-8 to 1-5-8 cents higher, and barley 1-3-8 to 2 cents higher. Domestic interests bought oats with closing futures 1-3-8 to 3-4 cent up. Flax was firm in light dealings.

LIVESTOCK

MONTREAL, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Due to labor troubles in the public abattoirs, Montreal livestock markets were disorganized today and prices were unestablished.

Receipts totalled 263 cattle, 184 calves, 169 sheep and lambs and 1,016 hogs.

Currencies

MONTREAL, Nov. 9.—(CP)—Pound Sterling slid 2-1-2 cents on Montreal foreign exchanges today to \$4.99 7-8 while the French franc declined .02 cent to 3.39 cents. The United States dollar held even at 1-16 per cent discount.
