FINAL STATEMENT 1943 Red Cross War Services Campaign

It is with a sense of pride and satisfaction that I herewith respectfully submit, on behalf of the Provincial Red Cross War Services Organization, a complete statement checked and audited, covering the Red Cross Campaign just closed. Total subscriptions \$98,384.52, of which \$87,615.81 has already been deposited in the Bank of Montreal.

Once again the people of Prince Edward Island have brought honor to our fair Province in the overwhelming manner in which they responded to the latest Red Cross War Services Appeal. This response was magnificent. This is the Third War Services Campaign conducted largely by the same aggregation of workers. This latest Campaign was a demonstration of co-ordinated effort on the part of District Chairmen, Supervisors, Captains and workers, and by the same token enthusiastic and spontaneous support of the business fraternity and the general public. The Campaign was a manifestation of approbation and appreciation of what the Canadian Red Cross Society is doing for men in uniform, as well as Prisoners of War, and the unfortunates in the conquered parts of the continent.

To the President of the Red Cross Society, Dr. W. J. P. McMillan, I wish to extend very cordial thanks for unfailing support and co-operation. The Divisional Chairmen, Capt. N. W. Lowther, Peter G. Clark, H. F. McPhee, K.C., A. F. McQuaid, K.C. and their able corps of assistants, have earned the highest praise for enabling this Province to be not only the first to achieve its objective, but also the Province that exceeded its undertaking by the largest percentage. This is a record of which every Islander may be justly proud.

The Newspapers and Broadcasting Stations supported the Campaign magnanimously. Publicity Chairman, Mr. Robert L. Cotton rendered distinguished service.

The Executive Officers and all Committees have served enthusiastically and wholeheartedly, for which I am profoundly grateful. And finally to the contributors, large and small, I wish to extend very sincere thanks and good wishes.

Prince Edward Island has covered herself with glory—and you workers and contributors have made this possible. Again—many, many thanks.
