## A PATRIOT VS. THE PATRIOT

Sir.—A patriot according to a standard authority is one, who loves and faithfully serves his country; and the true patriot of today in this world wide war is the man who leaves friends and home, position and honor and goes forth to fight his country's battles. Three thousand miles from here, under alien skies, in the trenches, is one of P. E. Island's patriots, in the person of Prof. J. A. McPhail fighting, for honor? No! For the flesh-pots of office? No! But fighting for the rights of France, for the rehabilitation of ravished Belgium, for the sovereignty of Britain, and for Canadian citizenship under the British flag.

In Charlottetown is another kind of patriot—his one of a brace of politicians who will oppose jointly or severally, Prof. McPhail in the provincial elections which must be held before January. This man is not the kind of man who fights the country's battles in the trenches but rather is he the one who would stay at home, and through his organ tell the people of Belfast if they did not wish Prof. McPhail opposed they have no right to nominate him. The only logical inference to draw from this sapient effusion is that a citizen who is honorable and patriotic enough to go to the front, and fight the Empire's battles, is by the reason of such patriotism unfit to represent a constituency in the Legislature. What do the electors of Belfast think of this? If necessary he is willing to fight, and if necessary to die for his country, must he be asked to sit in his seat according to this reasoning and hand it over to some stay-at-home arm chair critic hounding for office. We are also told the Mathieson Government are seeking to take advantage of a situation. This may mean that the Premier considered with the King in bringing on the war or else it means, there is a situation in the Belfast district favorable to the Government, and the result will be that the native son of Belfast who received the D. S. O. from King George by the people, will be handsomely elected.

It is true Prof. McPhail has not acquired the arts, that (in the brave days of old) were dispensed on the Patriot stairs, and that so often led to victory, but since then a new order of things has arisen, higher ideals are required in public life, and the man who is first to serve his country, in time of trial, is best fitted to serve the State.

In the words of the poet Campbell, "O, once again to freedom's cause receive proud recompense."
