3 World Records Shattered In U. S. Trials

STANFORD STADIUM, Palo Alto, Calif., July 15—Three world record performances contributed to a sensational beginning today for the final American Olympic track and field tryouts as upsets eliminated some of the nation's outstanding stars.

Two stalwart easterners, Leo Sexton and John Anderson, both of the New York A. C., surpassed world marks in the shotput and discus throw, respectively, after Eddie Tolian, Detroit negro flash, equalled his own world record of 104 seconds, against the wind, in the 100 metre trials.

Sexton topped the shotputters with a mighty heave of 52 feet 8 inches, as his most feared rival, Herman Brix, of the Los Angeles A. C., barely gained the fifth qualifying place by the thin margin of three-eighths of an inch, with a put of only 49 feet 2 inches. Sexton's toss was a half inch beyond the official world record.

Anderson hurled the discus 165.54 feet to surpass the listed world record of 163 feet, 8 1/2 inches, made in 1929 by Eric Krenz. Since then, however, Paul Jessup's new American record of 169 feet, 8 1/2 inches, has been put up for world record approval. Jessup was second today at 158.37 feet.

Fredton Takes Exception To Statement

(Canadian Press)

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 15—Exception is taken by local people in a position to know, to the statement published in the Financial Post, and alleged to be based upon the index calculated by the Ontario Bureau of Statistics, to the effect that "Fredericton alone of fifty-two cities shows increase" in rentals. The statement is made for the six month period ending with May last. With 100 taken as the index of rentals for May, 1931, and October, 1931, 102.5 is the figure for May, 1932.

The assessment department of the city of Fredericton is authority for the statement that rentals in Fredericton are stationary with indication of any change in a downward direction as in other centres of the Dominion. Owners of rentable properties in both residential and commercial sections, say that there is no upward tendency and rentals are stationary.

The reference to Fredericton is as follows: "Of a total of 52 cities from which the bureau receives returns, only one, namely Fredericton, showed an increase in rentals for the six month period ending May, 1932. Four centres, namely Charlottetown, P. E. I., Amherst, N. S., St. Hyacinthe, P. Q., and Rockville, Ontario, showed no changes, while the remaining 47 showed a decline."

In the same connection the city authorities point out that city assessment was not increased in 1932, but on the contrary shows a slight reduction.

BOYS ENJOY CAMPING AT CANOE COVE

M. R. E. C. - Y. M. C. A. Camp This Year An Unqualified Success.

The biggest and best Boys' Camp ever conducted at Canoe Cove came to a close yesterday. There were eleven leaders and seventy-six boys, coming from one end of the Island to the other. In all there were about ninety under canvas. Trinity United Church and the Y. M. C. A., Charlottetown, made up about one half of the camp. The United Church, Summerside and Bedeque and the Baptist Church, Summerside, were also well represented. Other groups came from St. Peter's Bay to O'Leary and intervening points.

In general the weather was ideal for camping. Last week, however, Canoe Cove was treated to a generous drenching but no boy was exposed or slept in a bed that was wet. The sun beamed down most of the time and left its rosy marks on bare backs and burnt faces.

The camp was under the direction of Rev. W. E. Aitken, St. Peter's Bay, who since 1925 has had a leading part in Boys' Camps and considers the camp of this year, taking into consideration its size and the general camp spirit, in many ways, the best he has ever conducted. He pays a high tribute to the leaders as one of the finest group of men he ever attempted to carry on a camp with.

The Business Manager for the camp was Mr. Ray Pendleton, tireless Secretary of the "Y." Under his direction the larder and the lads were well provided for. The expenses were kept at the lowest possible figure, while providing the best in everything, and when all bills were paid a neat balance remained to the credit of the camp.

The spiritual side of the program of life was not neglected. Before the boys left the breakfast table a short chapel service was conducted, at which a message was given by one of the leaders. From 9:30 to 10 a.m. Bible study was conducted by each group under the direction of its leader, and interest was no keener at any time than during this study period.

In the evening came the camp fire. There boys gathered for their daily sing song; to listen to the "Evening Tattler," the camp paper, capably edited by Harold Wright, Charlottetown; and the good night message by a member of the staff. Then as the boys sang "Taps," in bringing the day to a close they carried to their rest another reminder of the things which are worth while.

All games were carried out as scheduled. The thanks of the camp for the success of games is generally given to Mr. William Henry who so faithfully and capably gave of his time and talent.

The swimming this year received more attention than usual because of the expert direction of Mr. Harry Furslow, Milton, Mass. Mr. Furslow took complete charge of water sports and was satisfied with the results. Many boys who could not swim learned the art, and those who could swim were made more proficient. These sports were a leading feature of Visitor's Day, chief among which was the spectacular diving of Mr. Furslow himself. The best wishes of the campers follow Mr. Furslow to his southern home.

For convenience the boys were divided in six tribes or groups, each with its leader and little chief. This led to healthy competition and to the general uplift of camp spirit, which from the beginning to the end of the camp was manifest in sport and study group.

Trade Balance Of Dominion Is Favorable

OTTAWA, July 15—(By the Canadian Press)—Exports of Canadian products in June had a total value of \$40,945,490, which was the highest for any month this year. The increase was \$351,086 over May and \$13,968,734 over April. These figures were given in a statement issued this afternoon by H. H. Stevens, Minister of Trade and Commerce.

The total exports were \$41,701,975, and the imports \$40,743,101 which leaves a favorable balance for the month of \$957,874.

The exports for the 12-month ending June totalled \$547,385,36 and the imports \$316,247,343 leaving a favorable balance of \$231,038,027 in an aggressive trade of well over one billion dollars.
