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West Queens Teachers Convention

The annual convention of the West Queen's Teachers was held on Wednesday, Sept. 2nd, in the school-house at Hunter River, with the local president, Mr. D. N. Bell, presiding. In the absence of the secretary-treasurer, Mrs. M. McLeod was appointed to fill the vacancy. After the opening address by the president, the following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Pres., Mr. D. N. Bell; sec-treas., Miss Sadie Monkley. The following Question Box committee was then appointed: Miss Elizabeth Flemming, Miss Lizzie McKinnon and Mr. Victor Ling. A number of questions relating to school affairs were asked, discussed and answered. The next item on the program was an address by Inspector Court, who gave a very instructive and practical talk dealing first with the matter of School Fairs, then with Time Tables and ending with Discipline, showing the importance of teaching obedience, orderly habits, justice, and politeness. The morning session then adjourned. The afternoon session opened at 1.30. The first number on the program was an excellent and inspiring paper by Miss Georgie Boulter on "The Responsibility of the Public School Teacher," Supt. H. H. Shaw then addressed the meeting along the following lines: The course of studies, holidays, payment of salaries, reduction in salary when attendance was short of sixty per cent, and lastly advising all teachers to become acquainted with the School Act. The last number was a demonstration on valuing and correcting examination papers. Meeting closed by singing the National Anthem.

Mrs. Yaros had been engaged to prepare the wedding dinner. Stephen Patrick, 30, said that when he and his bride, Anna, 26, were about to sit at the table for the noon meal, Mrs. Yaros designated the plates they should take. Patrick explained that his wife winked at him, and suspecting a Yaros, standing at the feast table, suddenly put her hands on her

table and two other persons present, bent her head backward, ambulance, and fell to the floor. Taken to the hospital in an ambulance, she died Patrick, claimed supernatural powers. Guests at the wedding said that she was known as a witch, had attended several weddings every year, and distributed charms and told fortunes. It is said Mrs. Yaros carried with her a powder, which she allowed, if sprinkled on the food of the bride and bridegroom at the wedding dinner would guarantee their happiness and health during the remainder of their married lives.

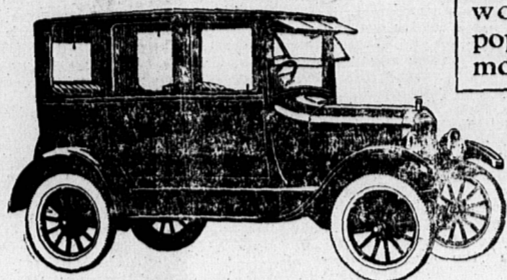
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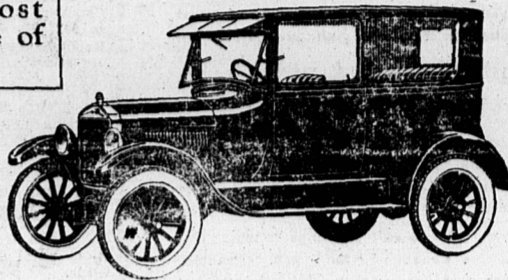
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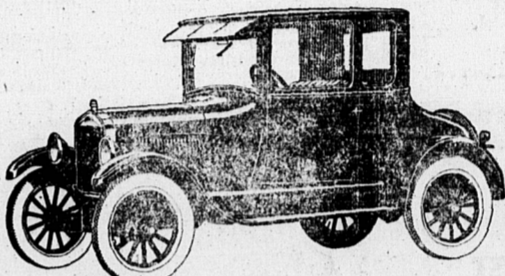
The Fordor Sedan

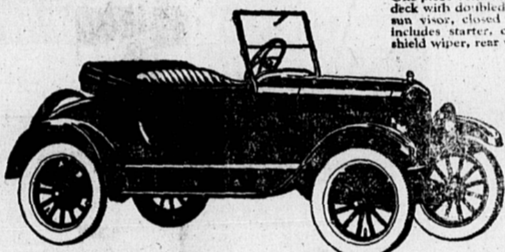
The Tudor Sedan

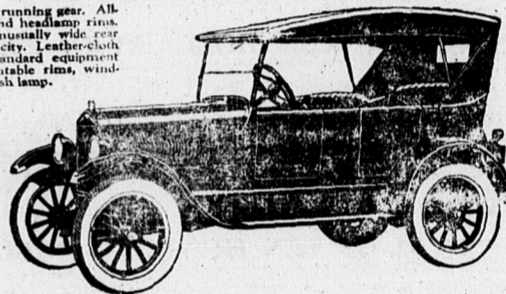
The Coupe
