## Rest Ordered For Shore

(A.P. by Guardian's Special Wire) BOSTON, Jan. 27.—The immediate hockey future of Eddie Shore, Boston Bruins defence man, rested tonight, the club's physician said, on further physical examinations and a complete rest.

Dr. Thomas A. Kelley, physician of the National League Club, said Shore was suffering from a sacroiliac injury which developed last summer. Last night, playing against New York Rangers, Shore tried to break up a Ranger attack and landed up against the boards. He was carried off the ice.

"We have made X-ray pictures of his injury," Dr. Kelley said tonight, "and we shall make some more in a few days. Until we make further examinations, it is hard to say just how long Shore will have to stay out of the game. At least, he will have to take a complete rest. Unless he does so, we may expect a recurrence of the injury at any time."

Last night's crash, Dr. Kelley added, aggravated the old injury.

## Junior Royals Make Thrilling Comeback But Lose High-scoring Game To Rangers 9-7

Jr. Rangers last night advanced into a tie for first place with the Abegweits in the Junior Hockey League when they turned back the Red Indian Royals 9 to 7 in a fast, wide-open encounter that nearly all the way produced the best show of hockey the Junior League has displayed this season.

Lightning fast and doited with clever playing the Rangers, flashing, sensational form at times, once threatened to make the game a run away as they built up a 6-1 lead in the first half of the game. There was apparently no holding the Prowse-Williams crew as they dominated the play. But suddenly, with only three minutes to go in the second period, Royals began to show the form they exhibited in their opening game. Before the session had finished they came through with three goals to make the score 6-4 and put an entirely different complexion to the game.

Imbued with new life Royals had a temporary halt called to their attacks as the Rangers scored early in the final session. But the losers were far from through. Fighting back grimly at the ten minute mark they had drawn to within one goal of their opponents and at this stage they were every bit as good as Rangers. But they were still trailing and as they sent every man up in search of the equalizer the Rangers broke through for two more goals to seal the verdict away, although in the final seconds Royals did notch up their seventh counter.

Rangers, without a doubt, were the smoother team and deserved their victory but the great comeback the Royals made last night earned them a host of followers and showed conclusively that they will be factors in the race for junior honors before the season draws to a close.

"Tarky" Whitlock led the goal-getters in the high scoring contest, notching three, while Ab McKinnon and Jay, teammates scored two apiece. Dick MacKinnon and Albert Wilson led the Royals with a brace of goals each.

## Youthful Defenceman For Red Wings

DETROIT, Jan. 27.—Young Jimmy Orlando, 175 pound bundle of fight from Pittsburgh and Montreal, stepped tonight into the toughest spot of his brief hockey career without fear of big league opponents or of the jinx on the position he is to fill.

The 21 year old defenceman, a year removed from Montreal amateur circles, joined the injury-ridden, high-flying Detroit Red Wings, Stanley Cup and National League champions, to become Bucko McDonald's third partner of the season.

His two predecessors, Captain Doug Young and Orville Rouleston, are out of action with broken legs. Jimmy, after a session on the Olympic ice here, said jinxes didn't worry him. He's ready to wear the No. two jersey that Young and Rouleston wore, filling the big defence vacancy as Detroit tries to protect its six point lead over New York Rangers.

The young Pittsburgh Hornet player caught Manager Jack Adams' eye 10 days ago in an International American League game when he battled on even terms with three fist swinging opponents on the Pittsburgh ice.

"He's the kind of player I like," Adams said. "Any one who tries to scare him by getting rough has a bit of a surprise coming."

## Irish Boxer Of Forging Nature

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—The forging Irish heart of Mike McEgane, former world's light heavyweight boxing champion, today brought a suspended sentence for two men who attacked him Jan. 16, because they thought he was a Nazi sympathizer.

"We're all Irishmen and I wasn't hurt much," Mike, formerly of Halifax, N. S., told Magistrate Leonard McGee, another Irishman, when James Carr, 27, and Frank McEibartan, 34, were arraigned on a charge of felonious assault. "I lost a couple of teeth and got a couple of black eyes but I don't want to press any charge against them."

The magistrate reduced the charge to disorderly conduct, found them guilty and suspended sentence.

NEW YORK, Jan. 27.—(AP)—Renewed hope flared in Bob Pastor's fight camp tonight as reports filtered into town that Joe Louis had been knocked down while sparring with Eddie Malcolm, Harlem negro, in a workout at Pompton Lakes today.

Although the portly Louis, laughingly insisting he had merely slipped, went on to give Malcolm a thorough dusting off, at least two newspapermen at the ringside claimed the Brown Bomber was knocked down and that he looked bad while falling.

Louis, taking the Pastor fight seriously, looked tip-top as he opened his day's sparring drill against Irish Mickey Glynn of New York. He battered Glynn, knocking him out after a minute of fighting. He took Malcolm on for a scheduled two-rounder. No sooner had they started to exchange blows than Louis was on the canvas.

George Barton, sports editor of the Minneapolis Tribune, and John Carmichael of the Chicago Daily News, said Malcolm cracked Louis on the head and that he went down under a clean blow. Others at ringside were of the opinion that Louis mis-timed a punch and fell. At any rate the Bomber arose and gave Malcolm a terrific thumping, then boxed two more rounds with Glynn.

Pastor, reported to be in peak condition took things easy. He jogged around Central Park and spent the rest of the day reading detective stories or playing cards.

Ticket sales spurted. Madison Square Garden officials estimated a gross gate of \$125,000.
