STEFANSSON NOW IN CANADA
(Special to The Guardian.)
WINNIPEG, Man., Aug. 26.—Wilmur Stefansson, famous Arctic explorer, arrived here Friday

the lines of the Canadian National Railways from the East. Mr. Stefansson while here will lecture on the friendly north and as he explained will try to arouse the people of Canada to the vastness of the Empire

which lies in the north of Canada. If the people of Canada would only realize it, the northern air route is the only practical one to develop, stated Mr. Stefansson. Within ten years time, a one-day mail service from Winnipeg to London will be an every day occurrence.

Mr. Stefansson went on to say, there are no arguments against the climate found in the north that were not put forward in the controversy which raged when it was first proposed to bridge the Prairies by railway, and I believe that in the same length of time it took Winnipeg to gain its present size there will be cities as far north as Churchill, and there will be cities such as Churchill that will be in ten years all along the northern coast of Canada.

Accompanying the famous explorer is Karyen Anderson, a member of Stefansson's last expedition. To Mr. Anderson goes the honor of having discovered the last bit of land in the Arctic, Meligen Island, which is now part of the Dominion.
