

Canadian Girl Guide Week

OCTOBER 17th TO 24th

Wednesday, October 21st is HOME CRAFT AND HANDCRAFT DAY in the Canadian Girl Guide Week, and Guides all across the Dominion have interesting plans and displays along those lines for the two special days.

To celebrate Homecraft and Handcraft Day in Charlottetown, Girl Guides of the four Companies who last season received their Cook's badges, have invited the members of the Local Association to an afternoon tea which they are holding in the Canadian Legion rooms today at 4.30. A very successful handcraft competition for the Guides of Prince Edward Island was held last year. The Provincial Council hopes to repeat the competition this season.

The homecraft badges that have been earned by Canadian Guides this past year show a marked increase over previous years. These include Laundress, Cook, Needlewoman, Child Nurse, Domestic Service and Sick Nurse. This will show that Guide leaders generally are alert to their responsibility of helping to train Canada's future housewives to run intelligent and healthy homes. Homecraft badges are planned to bring beauty and interest into the lives of Guides and to make them handier and more self-reliant.

With the apparent increase of leisure hours many Rangers are availing themselves of the instruction in entertaining crafts that are open to them. Winter programmes are planned to include dressmaking, Christmas-card making, knitting, budgetting, table service and Red Cross work.

For the Provincial Competitions for the Bessborough Shields, New Brunswick Guides are hooking rugs, and last year this province made quilts for the trophy and many beautiful and original designs were executed. British Columbia Guides had a general handcraft competition for their trophy.

Guide Hobby Fairs which are held in many places, prove a splendid means of stimulating interest in various crafts such as cake making, toy making, bird house building, etc.

To those engaged in character training it has become increasingly evident that there has been a tendency in our modern life to stero-type the habits and even the very thoughts of children. Girl Guiding though supervised handcraft and homecraft is attempting to stimulate self expression in the daily life of its members.

Brownies are not little girls who are being kept out of mischief until they are old enough to be Girl Guides: they are little people being trained constructively to hang up their clothes, wash their faces and hands before meals, make their beds so their toes will not stick out and be very handy little folk as well as cheerful and quiet helpers in the home.

Girl Guides throughout the Dominion are now busily engaged collecting dolls and toys of all kinds to be renovated and made like new for Santa Claus. Under supervision all sorts of adjustments are made:—a nose on a dolly, a wheel on a wagon, a leg on a Teddy Bear. The Scout-Guide Christmas Toy Shops are well known by now across Canada, where the Guides attend to the intricacies of doll wardrobes and the Scouts take care of the woodwork and large mechanical toys.

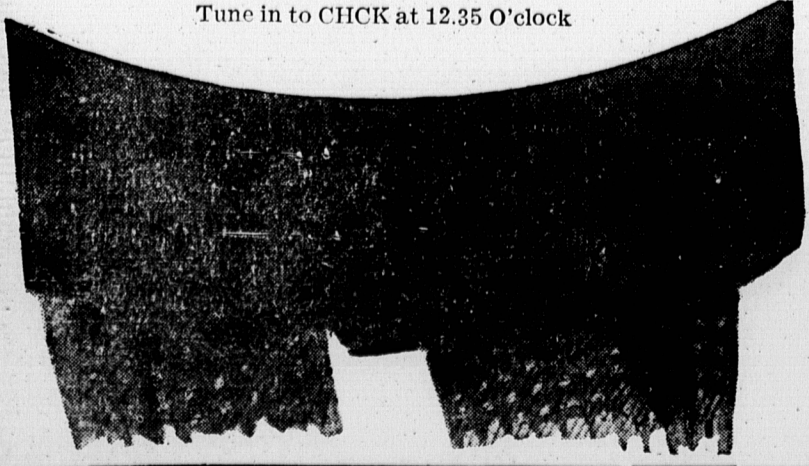

New Plant Addition
