SUMMERSIDE, P. E. I., March 6.—Borden Nationals sprung a surprise last night when they shut out Alberton Regals by three goals and copped the McLean Cup for this year in the sudden death game played here last night to decide the winner of the Prince County Intermediate League.

About 600 fans came by special trains from east and west to witness the game. This is Borden's first year in the league and much credit is due them as the Regals have a well earned reputation of being hard to beat and put up a hard fight last night. The breaks were all against Alberton and only for Allenach's stellar goal minding, the score would certainly have read differently. Harper and Campbell did the scoring on clever plays and were a constant menace to Alberton.

PIONEERING IN NOTED ARCTIC WEST AFRICA MISSIONARY TO VISIT CITY

Subject of Lecture by Rev. A. W. Banfield At St. James Hall Last Evening.

"Pioneering in West Africa" was the subject of an illustrated lecture by Rev. A. W. Banfield of the British and Foreign Bible Society at St. James Hall last evening. The speaker flashed on the screen fifty slides depicting life, conditions, and missionary endeavors in Nigeria, the second largest colony under the British Crown. The country is densely populated and has about 20,000,000 inhabitants. Several cities inhabited almost entirely by blacks have populations of more than 100,000 people. The cities have a system of government of their own, and also a system of sanitation.
