TUBERCULAR COWS AT TRURO.

TRURO, March 24.—The Sydney Post says editorially: Mr. Corning, of Yarmouth, and Mr. Zwicker, of Lunenburg, speaking from their places in the house of assembly at Halifax, have made definite charges of a most serious nature against the management of the government's boated agricultural college and farm at Truro.

These members of the legislature positively assert that cattle suffering from tuberculosis have been sold from the government farm during the past four years. They further assert that in allowing these beasts to be thus disposed of, the authorities are guilty of either criminal negligence or unpardonable ignorance.

In a communication published in another column of this issue of The Post will be found the details of the charges preferred by Messrs. Corning and Zwicker. They produce what they claim to be proof that the animals were tubercular when they were sold, and no one will question the conclusion that the officials either knew it or most certainly should have known it, and should not have allowed the sale.

To permit these plague stricken beasts to go abroad to affect herds with which they would be associated, and to spread around the germs of death-dealing tuberculosis would be a most reprehensible act, nothing short of a crime against the health of the people of this province. It is almost unbelievable that it should be done willfully, but lack of knowledge would be a despicable excuse to put up in palliation of such an offence.

The charge demands instant investigation of a most thorough nature, and if it be shown that this thing was done either by the connivance of the officials or because they did not exercise proper care, the punishment should be sharp and sure. The government that would tolerate such a state of affairs should not be permitted to continue in power for a day longer than is absolutely necessary to receive their resignation and appoint their successors.

OF SPECIAL INTEREST

ALBANY, N. Y., March 26 (Special)—After two lengthy conferences, one last night and the other this morning, Governor Sulzer and Charles S. Whitman have agreed that there is no reason why the Governor should interfere in the police situation in New York City now.

While the police situation in New York was the principle topic discussed at both conferences, the charges of bribery in connection with the attempt to have Harry K. Thaw released from Matteawan were also discussed. The Governor later declared that Thaw would be called before the Grand Jury to tell all he knows about the matter.

In answering his decision not to interfere with the police situation in New York at present the Governor said: "I am so great a believer in the principle of home rule that I am opposed to any interference in local affairs unless there is a public necessity and it is an extreme case. I certainly see no reason now for interference in the New York police situation."

Besides the police situation and the Thaw bribery affair, the Governor and Mr. Whitman also took up the case of "Happy Jack" Mulrany, convicted of murder, who last Monday received a respite of sixty days from the Governor. Mr. Whit-

man promised to make a thorough investigation of the case, to ascertain if there had been a miscarriage of justice, and to report to the Governor as soon as possible.

PORTLAND, March 27 (Special)—Storms along the Maine coast have interfered greatly with the operations of the fishermen, and the Portland markets have been without fish most of the time since last November.

All through the Lenten season there was not half enough cod, haddock, cusk or halibut to supply the local market.

The first fishermen to reach Portland with a fare after a storm of four or five days' duration received phenomenal prices. A York man fishing in a power dory a few miles from shore hooked a good sized halibut and landed it after half an hour's struggle. There had been no halibut in Portland for two weeks. He headed for this port and received \$48 for his fish.

A Peak's Island lobster fisherman obtained \$9 for four lobsters. They were not unusually large ones at that.

Frank Woodbury, of Long Island, six miles from here made a remarkable catch last week. Of the Cape Elizabeth lights he took from his trawl two cod. One weighed ninety pounds and the other eighty.

A few days ago Captain Downey, of the Gloucester fishing schooner Josephine, caught simultaneously on one line two cod which weighed one hundred pounds. The larger weighed six and a half pounds. The average size codfish of from five to ten pounds generally is landed easily by simply "keeping him coming" all the time, the big steak cod of from fifty pounds upward furnish a man's battle before they give up the struggle.

BOCHUM, March 24 (Special)—What was feared would turn out to be a mining catastrophe of considerable proportions occurred at the President Colliery, near here. The shaft of the pit burst into flames soon after midnight Wednesday and fire has been raging in the galleries ever since.

Mr. Herr Koester, the superintendent of the mine, was trapped underground, together with a number of miners, whose total is uncertain.

Bands of rescuers were formed by the miners not on duty, and they made several efforts to penetrate into the galleries, but after working for several hours they were able to advance only a short way. They succeeded, however, in finding the body of the superintendent at the bottom of the shaft.

Later the miners working in the galleries of the pit were brought out alive and unhurt.

DOCTORS HIMSELF AND NOW IS STONE DEAF. SPOKANE, Wash., March 25.—Because he believed his ears needed doctoring and that kerosene, which would be recommended by a friend, would clean them, C. F. Dugan, railroad man of Tekoa, Wash., is today stone deaf, and his physician says he may never recover his hearing.

Mr. Dugan poured a quantity of kerosene in each ear and commenced to scrub. A few hours later he was unable to hear ordinary conversational tones, and in a few hours was totally deaf. He suffered great pain and was brought to Spokane for treatment.

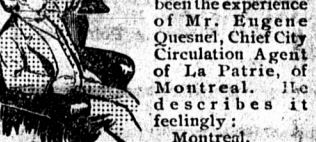

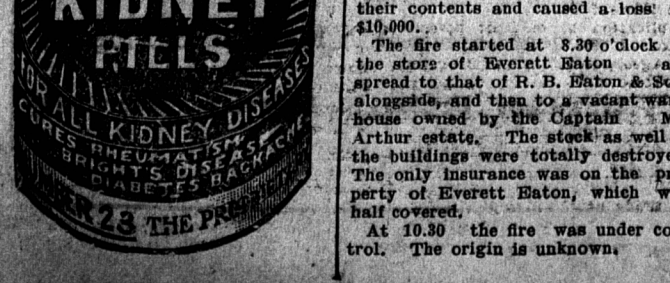
