To us, they looked like diamonds in the rough, very, very rough at present, however.

As an opportunist Layton Schurman is in a class by himself. He doesn't make dazzling rushes up the ice. So far this year he and the others of his line do not look particularly smooth coming over the enemy blue-line. He is not an aggressive lighter in the corners behind the opponents' net.
