PROVINCE OF PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND  
**The Criminal Code—The Motor Vehicle Act PUBLIC NOTICE**

Persons convicted for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated will be liable to a term of imprisonment not exceeding thirty days and not less than seven days. In each case the operator's license will be suspended for a period not less than sixty days.

Persons twice convicted will be liable to a term of imprisonment not exceeding three months and not less than one month, and will not be permitted to operate motor vehicles during a period of twelve months.

A person convicted for more than two offences of operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated will be liable to a term of imprisonment not exceeding one year and not less than three months. Such persons will not again be granted an operator's license.

In each of the above cases the registration plates may be withdrawn. Section 69 of the Motor Vehicle Act provides as follows:

"In the event of any person holding a chauffeur's or an operator's license contravening any of the provisions of this Act by reason of reckless or negligent driving or by reason of the use of intoxicants or for any other reason becoming, in the opinion of the Secretary, unfit to act as a chauffeur or operator, the Secretary shall, upon proof to his satisfaction of the fact of existence of such contravention or offences, AND WITHOUT THE NECESSITY OF HOLDING ANY FORMAL OR PUBLIC OR OTHER HEARING, either cancel the license of such chauffeur or operator absolutely or suspend the same and all rights of the licensee thereunder for such period as the Secretary may think fit.

In the event of cancellation of license all the rights of the licensee hereunder shall forthwith abate and cease absolutely."
