War Veterans Column

ONE AGAINST THE SCOT.—A tired Scottish soldier, in the course of his wandering up the line, met an English soldier, equally tired with the slow travelling. To kill time they decided on a game of nap. After several hours play the Scot had won four shillings and fourpence. The train drew up at the station and the Englishman prepared to pay his losses. He managed to scrape together four shillings and three pence half penny in change, and a one pound treasury note. The Scot hadn't change for the note so the Englishman handed him the change, remarking: "Ter's a halfpenny short, Mac. What shall we do?" "Dinna fash yerse!" said the Scot. "It's a wee sma' matter. I'll take yer 'Daily Mail' that'll mak' it square!"

GERMAN GUNS.—We are informed that the City fathers have handed over to the Veterans new home a German Trench Mortar and a Machine Gun. We are very pleased to hear this, as we consider the Veterans are entitled to them. We feel sure the Veterans will appreciate the action of the City fathers in this matter.

SOLDIERS INSURANCE.—We were asked last week if the Government Insurance for soldiers on the ten payment life plan, was not cheaper at age 31 than that issued by the regular companies. We find the Government rate for this plan is \$3.26 per month or \$39.12 per annum. The rate charged by the regular companies for a ten payment plan is \$38.40 per annum. This policy will pay at death of as much as \$50,000 a year for the sum insured to his beneficiary the sum is very much the same plan as is used by the Government. Both policies include the total disability clause. While speaking of the disability clause, we think it is only fair to say that the clause issued by the regular companies is far ahead of that issued by the Government, as not only do the companies pay a larger amount on assured becoming totally disabled, but they do not deduct such payments from emment do under their policies. In the case of obtaining the cash surrender value of the Government policy, at the end of the period or payment, it would appear that the policy is very unsatisfactory, as cause must be shown to the

satisfaction of the Board why the surrender of the policy should be permitted. If we have in this, or in previous issues made any mistake in explaining the new Government insurance policy we will be glad to be corrected. We will be pleased to furnish any information asked for, and in the meantime we strongly advise any man who cannot get insurance elsewhere to make application for the Government plan at once, as it is a godsend for him, and the Government is to be commended for bringing the scheme into effect.

DOCTOR LOCATED.—We are pleased to hear that Dr. Fred Taylor has decided to locate here. He is hanging out his shingle at 123 Prince Street. Dr. Taylor served in France as Medical Officer of the 28th Battalion. He was later on attached to the staff of No. 4 Field Ambulance and No. 2 Stationary Hospital. We feel sure that command Taylor will meet with success in his chosen profession amongst us.

TECHNICAL SCHOOL.—We are very pleased to see that local government have appointed at least two returned men on the staff of the new Technical School which is to be opened shortly in the old Rena McLean Memorial Hospital. Mr. Vernon Crockett has been appointed Principal of the school, and Mr. Waugh formerly an officer of the 25th Battalion has been appointed instructor in the Wood working Department. In these appointments we feel sure the Government will have no cause of regret. We are also very pleased to hear that the local government through Principal Crockett have come to an understanding with the City School Board, to train formerly city boys from the City schools each day in Manual Training. (We trust that this arrangement will work satisfactorily for both parties.)

BRIGHTON ROAD.—Last Monday a car was driven out this road shortly after noon going at the rate of at least 25 or 30 miles an hour. There appears to be still a few drivers who care nothing of the law nor of the inconvenience caused by clouds of dust from their cars travelling at an excessive speed to those who live on this road. We suggest that this road be visited more frequently by our policemen, as there is too much speeding on it.

TRAINING FOR BOYS.—Approximately 300,000 boys in New York State have been required to register under the provisions of the State's military training law. The ages for registration are between 16 and 18 years.

CORNWALL MEMORIAL.—The splendid memorial erected by the efforts of the Woman's Institute of Cornwall and District, to the memory of those who fell in the war, is to be unveiled at 2 p. m. Thursday, October 7th. Cornwall is only a short distance from Charlottetown and it is hoped that large number of people will attend the unveiling ceremony.

NOVA SCOTIA VETERANS' CONVENTION.—H. R. Stewart, our Provincial Secretary was present at this convention held at Digby, N. S., last week, and reports that it was the most successful convention held in Canada by the G. W. V. A. to date. Some forty delegates were present from the branches throughout Nova Scotia. Gen. Thacker was chosen as Honorary President, and Col. C. E. Bent, D. S. O. of Amherst, late O. C. 15th Battalion and an original member of that unit was unanimously elected President. Reports for the past year were submitted, and plans for the coming year drawn up. Many important resolutions were passed, covering not only matters concerning the interests of the returned men, but the welfare of the country at large. The most important being, perhaps, that regarding education in Nova Scotia. C. G. McNeil, Dominion Secretary, G. W. V. A., was present and provided of invaluable assistance in explaining the work attempted and accomplished by the Dominion Command. The convention adjourned the 22nd to meet at Amherst 1921.

GOOD RECORD.—Gen. Sir Edward Morrison, in a recent speech, alluding to the glorious record of the Canadian corps, said it achieved three things which he believed were unique in the history of war. These were not generally known to Canadians, but should be known to all. They were: The Canadians fought in 20 battles and never lost a gun; they never lost a piece of ground that they did not retake, and they never had an objective they did not reach.
