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Lively Contest Shaping In 2nd Prince Election

On Tuesday, September 17 a by-election will be held in the 2nd district of Prince to choose a successor to the late Hon. W. F. Dennis who held the seat for 31 successive years prior to his death this summer. Only property owners may vote in this contest but this includes residents of other parts of the Province who own property in that district.

Although there appear to be no outstanding local issues in this election the campaign is being fought vigorously, both sides having outside organizers on the spot to help the candidates and poll committees. The Progressive Conservative party have chosen Mr. Allie McNeill of West Cape as their candidate. Mr. McNeill, a fifty years old farmer and this is his first appearance as a candidate having been defeated by the late Mr. Dennis at the last general election.

Mr. Forrest W. Phillips of Mourz Royal, the Liberal candidate, is also a farmer, fifty-eight years of age and is making his first appearance in active politics. In one respect this campaign is unique in that both sides have agreed that there shall be no public meetings, neither the joint kind peculiar to Prince Edward Island and possibly Quebec, or purely party gatherings. Reason given for this is the prevalence of infantile paralysis but the fact that neither candidate shows much ability as a platform speaker is probably the real reason. Private canvases and broadcasts are being relied on by both sides extensively. The main feature of radio talks is that they give an opportunity to the speakers to be quoted in the newspapers. Conservatives would like to win this election following their victory in First Prince last year. It would give them three straight in the by-elections that they have contested since the last general election, and would increase their strength in the legislature. The Liberals are fighting tooth and nail to hold the district and overcome the effect of last year's defeat and regain some of the prestige lost at that time.

A Liberal Stronghold

Historically, Second Prince is a Liberal stronghold and therefore a victory for the Conservatives would be all the more valuable while a defeat would be very bitter for the Liberals.

Mr. Dennis held the seat for thirty-one years but in two general elections there with a running mate was defeated by a Conservative. The Conservatives also won a by-election there with the Liberal government in power when the present Chief Justice the Hon. Thane A. Campbell, his breaking into active politics. New Canadian Stamps Out Monday

TORONTO, Sept. 13—(OP)—A four-months' wait by Canadian stamp collectors ends Monday, Canada's first post-war "stamp day" when nine pictorial stamps of what has been termed the Reconstruction Issue go on sale.

The expectation is that main post offices across Canada will do a land-office business with queues of unseasonal customers—people who want stamps not solely to carry correspondence but rather to gain the prized first-day covers. These are stamped envelopes with first-day post office cancellations.

Caught short on the first day of the War Effort series, the hobbyists are determined to be on hand early this time. The last issue appeared on a holiday, Dominion Day, 1942, when all but a few main offices were closed.

A busy period is in prospect, as well, for the sale of the new pictorials because stamp speculators—as distinct from true philatelists—figure that postal-rate changes are soon to come and obsolete values will jump in market price.

LONDON, Sept. 13—(OP)—Sympathizers supplied food today to some squatters in commandeered London buildings and a Communist leader declared four more families had been smuggled into the Ivanhoe Hotel despite police guards.
