—RINK OPENING—The Kensington ice arena was opened under auspicious circumstances on Tuesday night, December 17th. Nature smiled, the country roads were good, and the moon shone in all its glory. Most all the available teams in Summerside were requisitioned for the event. The formal opening took place at 8 o'clock when Mayor J. M. Leard stepped on the ice and in a few well chosen remarks, referring to the great benefit accruing to the community on account of the construction of the rink, declared it open to the public. The balcony and girders were nicely decorated with flags and bunting, which gave a bizarre and patriotic effect. The great electric musical amplifier installed by the McKay Sales Co., is an unqualified success. The volume of musical sound produced is immense, it can be heard for at least a quarter of a mile from the building. When the electric switch is turned on the building is like one gargantuan music box, literally oozing music from an apparently invisible source. The mechanism being operated by a switch in the box office. There is a fine refreshment booth near the main entrance, where hot weiner-wursts, coffee, tea and effervescent drinks may be procured. The "opening" was patronized by over 500 delighted and enthusiastic devotees of the great Canadian pastime. The directors and citizens wish to thank the R. T. Holman Co., who so kindly broadcast the event for some days previously, also the patrons from adjacent localities, who, in some cases, drove ten miles in order to be present. A gala season of winter ice sports is expected for the people of Kensington and vicinity.—K.

—WINTER ICE RACING—The coming ice racing season promises to be the best ever. There appears to be more speedy horses and a greater interest by a greater number. Summerside has some real good ones. Mack Steele has fourteen race horses under his care, among them Chimes Dillon, (by Dillon Axworthy), and a high bred two-year-old colt. These horses are "sub rosa" as to ownership, but they are generally understood to be the property of Captain Read, who takes a great interest in light harness racing. It is some years since the genial Captain made his debut in the "Sport of Kings"—in the days when Parkside was King of the P. E. Island turf—to be precise. Lately the hero of the Archangel war trips has returned to his first diversion with renewed vigor and made a discernible scintillation last summer with Mickey Aubrey and Louise Colorado. George Callbeck and Dr. Church have some good imported stock, which will be heard from in the near future. John Crockett has James Aubrey, raised by Simpson Bros., Amherst, and campaigned last summer by the doughty and redoubtable Tom Holmes. Tyn-dal Semple has York Oia, who showed three consistent miles, all under 2.20 last fall at the New Annan Matines. There is also the Laocpla pacing mare Jacqueline, (Harold Mulally, Kensington). The New London district has many promising colts. The writer regrets that he is unable, at the present writing, to give a resume of the good ones, but hopes to be able to do so at some time in the near future. ### FEAST OF LIGHTS, JEWISH CEREMONY OPENS ON DEC. 26

TORONTO, Dec. 22.—The Feast of Lights, known in Hebrew as Hanukkah, will be celebrated by the Jewish people for a period of eight days, beginning with Thursday evening, Dec. 26, and ending with Friday, Jan. 3, 1930.

This feast is characterized by its beautiful ceremonial of lighting candles in the home and the synagogue, the number of candles being increased by one each consecutive evening. It has its origin in a historic experience of the Jewish people, embracing memories and achievements so unique and heroic that it is ardently cherished and commemorated by Jews of every rank and affiliation, of every sentiment and cultural aspiration.

Following the death of Alexander the Great in 323 B. C. E., Palestine was the bone of contention between the Seleucids, who ruled in Syria, and the Ptolemies, who ruled in Egypt. In

the year 168 B. C. E., Antiochus Epiphanes, having political control of Palestine, sought to root out the Jewish religion and its practices.

He converted the Temple of Jerusalem into a sanctuary to Jupiter, and set up the statue of the Greek god on the temple altar. He erected heathen altars in many country towns and commanded the Jews to eat of forbidden foods. He ordered Torah-scrolls to be rent in pieces, and placed the practice of Jewish rites under penalty of death. In this way, Antiochus Epiphanes sought to uproot every vestige of Judaism from the land of Judah.

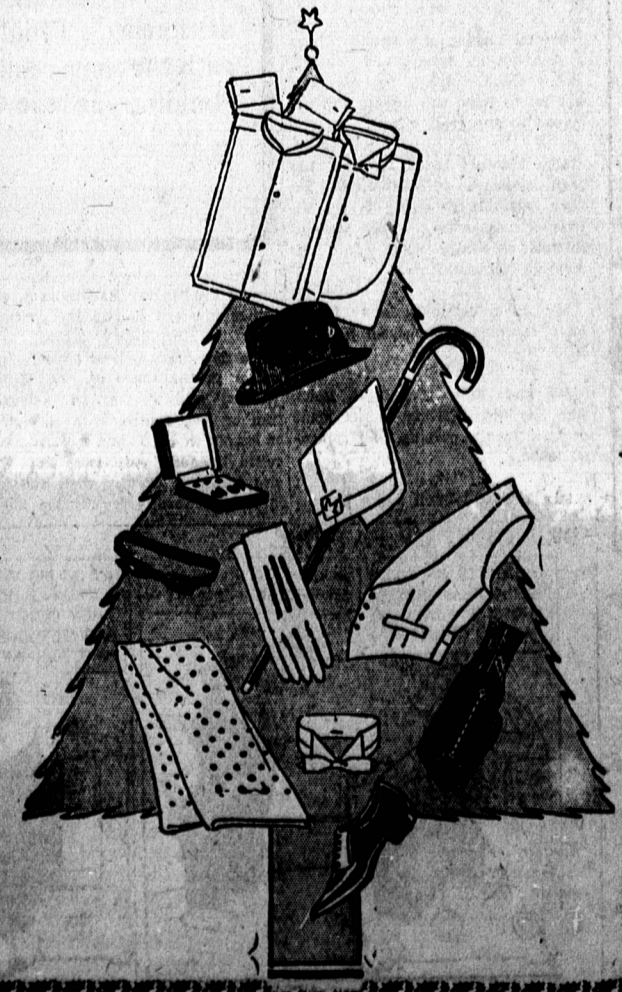
