Imperial Co's Works Will be Stopped—Transferred to the Edwardsburg Co.

MONTREAL, Feb. 4.—(Special).—An organization meeting of the recently incorporated Canada Starch Company was held yesterday.

The works of the Imperial Starch Company at Prescott will not be operated. The factory at Prescott has not been on a paying basis and the shareholders are considering themselves fortunate in receiving a proportion of the new stock.

However, the stockholders of the Imperial Starch Company will only be given a certain proportion of common stock, the works being heavily bonded.

The business of the Prescott plant will be transferred to the Edwardsburg Company at Cardinal.

The Canada Starch Company, Ltd., has a capital of \$1,250,000 of 7 per cent non-cumulative preferred stock and a similar amount of common.

VIOLENT DEATH OF A WATCHMAN

NEW YORK, Feb. 4.—(Special).—Dead about two hours, with his skull crushed in by an axe, John Arthur, a Canadian employed as night watchman on the pile driver, was found today in the cabin house of the craft in Hudson River.

Mine Owners will Work the Collieries at their Full Capacity.

MAHONEY CITY, PA., Feb. 4.—(Special).—All of the collieries throughout the anthracite region have been ordered to work at their full capacity from now until next April.

A number that have been closed for some time will be reopened immediately. The coal companies hope by these means to increase their store of coal by five million tons before the threatened strike begins.

BANK MANAGER COMMITS SUICIDE

KINGSTON, Feb. 4.—(Special).—The body of Roderick Mackenzie, manager of the Bank of Montreal here, was found about two miles from town today.

A bottle containing a drug was near the body and death was evidently due to suicide. Mackenzie's father was Chief Factor in the service of the Hudson Bay Company.

He entered the service of the Bank of Montreal in the year 1897 and served at St. John, Halifax, Newcastle, Cornwall, Ont., and in Kingston.

FATAL ACCIDENT ON G. T. RAILWAY

Near Montreal—Boiler of Locomotive Explodes—The Fireman killed—The Engineer Slightly Injured.

MONTREAL, Feb. 4.—(Special).—The boiler of locomotive No. 207 hauling the Vaudreuil local on the Grand Trunk Railway exploded while the train was on the outskirts of the city on Saturday evening.

Fireman Sharp was instantly killed and engineer Brown was seriously injured. Both men were blown through the windows of the cab. The passengers on the train heard the noise of the explosion. The train was on down grade at the time and when it was stopped a visit to the engine disclosed the fact that the men manning it were missing.

LORD STRATHCONA A RECORD HOLDER

LONDON, Feb. 2.—Lord Strathcona and Mount Royal, the veteran High Commissioner of Canada, probably adds to his other distinctions that of being the holder of the record as a transatlantic passenger.

"I really have not kept count," he said, "of the number of times I have voyaged to and fro at least one hundred and fifty times, if not more.

"According to the steamship companies this is something near the record for a passenger. I have seen many changes, indeed am amazed at the wonderful advance made in the speed, size and comforts of ocean travelling. These new turbine steamers are marvellous. In my early voyages to Canada we tossed about in a small, uncomfortable craft for fourteen or fifteen days.

MGR. BRUCHESI'S TEMPERANCE PLAN

MONTREAL, Feb. 2.—His Grace Archbishop Bruchesi, has issued a letter on the subject of temperance, in which he draws up a program for the Temperance Societies organized in connection with his crusade against intemperance. His Grace is the President, and it is to be divided into parochial districts, and in each district the Parish Priest will be the director. In this society there are to be three classes, that of children from First Communion to the age of eighteen, that of young people from eighteen until marriage, and that of married people. There will be no monetary contribution exacted. The members pledge themselves to make no use of alcoholic or distilled liquors, except in case of sickness, nor to permit of their use in the family, and above all not to frequent saloons, and to abstain from the habit of treating.
