THE MAURETANIA LEAVES ENGLAND ON A FAST TRIP

Keen Interest Taken in the Event---It is Expected that She Will Excel the Performance of the Lusitania, Though It is Said She Will Not Be Forced

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 17--(Special)--The huge new Cunard liner, Mauretania sailed from Liverpool this evening on her maiden trans-atlantic passage. The event was attended with interest fully as keen as that which marked the Lusitania's first departure for America. The Mauretania's recent trials established the conviction that she will surpass the Lusitania's achievement, notwithstanding the official announcement that she will not be pushed.

Cromer is the Big Executive of Egyptians

A Remarkable Speech on Habits of Egyptian Misers - The Gold Influx - Many Interesting Facts from a Notably Interesting Manager

LONDON, Eng., Nov. 16--The Earl of Cromer, on being presented with the freedom of the City, was described by Sir Joseph Dimsdale as the great Pharaoh of Egypt. Taking up the cue, the ex-dictator of Egypt also made a few compliments. He referred to the King as "that very eminent diplomatist," praised Lord Lansdowne and Sir Edward Grey for their excellent conduct of foreign affairs, and said a good word for Sir Eldon Gorst, his successor. Those people who criticised the Anglo-Egyptian Convention because of the internal policy of the Russian Government he reminded that one of the surest methods of achieving success was to pay attention exclusively to one's own business. The English people were rather prone to incur the reputation abroad of offering advice about matters which did not concern them. Turning to the question of the enormous influx of gold into Egypt of recent years--£13,000,000 more than the exports in the last four years--Lord Cromer said a great deal went into jewellery. Moreover, hoarding was carried on to an extent which appeared almost incredible to Europeans. A little while ago an Egyptian died leaving a fortune of £40,000. The whole of that was found in gold coin in the cellar. Again a substantial yeoman bought property of £25,000. Half an hour after the contract had been signed he appeared with a train of donkeys, bearing on their backs the whole of that sum in coin, which had been buried in his garden. There could be no doubt that the practice of hoarding was carried on to an excessive degree. Saving banks, increased circulation of paper money and additional banking facilities would gradually wean the natives from this uneconomic habit. The gradual expansion of local government in Egypt had his entire sympathy, but with the Egyptian Nationalists, who existed in Cairo as well as Calcutta and in Dublin he did not think it was possible to deal. They would not be conciliated save on terms which in India and Ireland spell political suicide, and in Egypt would involve a relapse to the misgovernment and disorder of the past. He noticed the almost comical folly of an itinerant M. P., Mr. Keir Hardie, had incited the ill-regulated enthusiasm of a portion, and that certainly by no means the wisest portion, of the community in Bengal. The agitators of India, he did not doubt, would be kept well in hand by the firm sagacity of the Viceroy and the eminent statesman (Mr. Morley) who now presided at the India Office. Lord Cromer declared in conclusion that the Government should come down with a heavy hand upon the extremists should they overstep the limits of the law, and not be deterred by their presence from adopting such reforms as were calculated to satisfy the aspirations of all moderate and reasonable men.

CAPITALISTS FEAR GLUT IN SILVER MARKET

TORONTO, Nov. 16--Because United States smelters have practically refused to take Cobalt ores a policy of retrenchment will be adopted by many mine managers within the next few days. The present financial stringency is given as the reason of the smelters, but it is believed there is more behind it than the tightness of money. Owing to the depression on the other side not so much silver is being used in the arts, and this naturally causes the falling off in demand. It is generally known, too, that the price of silver has declined within the last year. In view of these facts it is expected by Cobalt mining men that there is prospect of a glut in the silver market and the smelting companies think, if the present output were maintained, the price would go still lower.

A MILITARY SCANDAL STARTLES ENGLISH COURT

LONDON, Nov. 16--A big military scandal which threatens to occupy the courts here shortly is an old story of "ragging" in the Guards. The "ragged" officer, contrary to military precedent, has determined to invoke the law, and the decision has created the greatest excitement. The officer, who was a lieutenant in the Grenadier Guards, had certain personal habits which disturbed his brother officers who in consequence hazarded him unmercifully. When he took the case to his Colonel the only satisfaction he got was a demand for his papers. He thereupon resigned, and now intends taking action against the Colonel for ruining his career. The Grenadier Guards are mostly officered by scions of the peerage, and every effort is being made to keep the case outside the courts and prevent the matter becoming public.
