LONDON, July 12.—A despatch from Kitchener, dated Pretoria, says the Boers attacked a constabulary post at Houkkoj on July 11, capturing a seven pound gun. They were eventually driven off. The British loss was three men killed and seven wounded.

HILDEBERG, SOUTH AFRICA.

MAY 10 1901.

DEAR FRIEND:—As we are now in camp and settled I will drop you a letter to let you know how I am getting along. I suppose Charley has told you all about our trip across. We are now stationed at a place by the name of Hildeberg. It is a very pretty place. I tell you they are more than drilling us here. We drill three times a day, one hour before breakfast and two in the afternoon. They are very strict in drill and in camp. Everything has to be done just so. They fine us for nearly nothing, and never less than a pound at a time; so you see that they are bound to get some of our wages out of us. The Boers are all around us in small parties all the time, and we are turned out often, every time expecting to have a scrap, but so far we could not get handy enough to them. There was a party of Boers out at Bushman's Cop last week staying at an old farm house out there; so one hundred Canadians were picked out to go out after them, I was in town at the time and was not picked out. When I came back to camp I heard about it so I went out and coaxed a fellow for his place. He at last consented and I went. We left camp on foot at one o'clock in the morning for eighteen miles of a march. We did not arrive at the place till daylight and they saw us coming and flew, so the only thing we could do was to turn around and come back. We were back at four o'clock that evening I was more than tired I tell you, 33 miles is no easy march. The next time I coaxed a fellow for to get his place to go on a long march like that I will be sure to have some crapping. We have not got our horses yet nor have any idea when we will get them, I do not expect to get one for there are three cyclists in the S. A. C. and I am getting on there. I expect they have the three cyclists for carrying messages all over the country. I did not try to qualify for corporal out here as I did not think it worth while to try because lots of the Sergeants are only getting in as Corporal out here. You asked me to send you some relics, I am sorry to say that I cannot get anything, as the Kafirs are gathering up everything and sending it to America. Please excuse scribbling and this dirty paper as we have no place to keep our writing materials.
Remember me as ever your friend.
