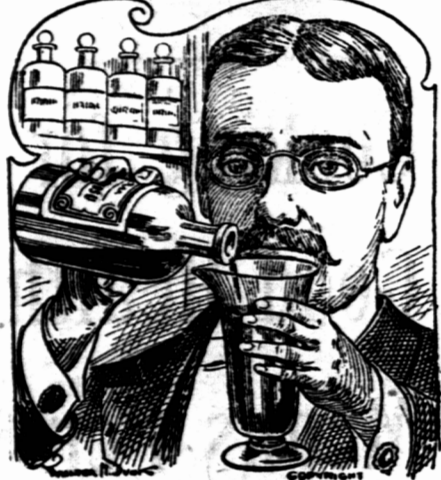

The Halifax arrived yesterday morning with a large cargo including 304 bales wire for Dodd & Rogers and R. I. Holman, 329 coils rope for W. F. Tidmarsh. John Gillis was the only passenger.

The Guardian had a visit yesterday from Chief Sark of Lennox Island, Chief of the Miqsoa Indians of the Island. The Chief came to the city yesterday from the west and remains in this part of the Province a few days.

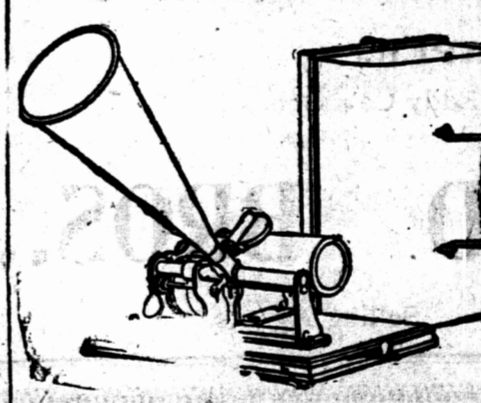
