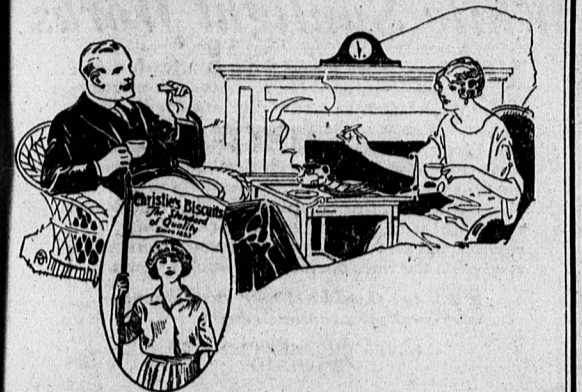

HOLSTEIN RECORDS.—Island cows that figure in the March, 1924, reports include Jean Abberk Pontiac owned by W. R. Boyer, Bunbury, who led her group of junior four year olds in the seven day division. Jean gave just 24 1/2 lbs. butter in 7 days. We understand this is Mr. Boyer's first year and the result must be highly pleasing to him. Bunbury Farm also scores with two heifers barely two years old. The best one gave 72 1/2 lbs. butter in 365 days and the other 690 lbs. butter. These records win for them third and fourth places for two year olds against all Canada. A record 1032 1/2 lbs. butter in 360 days on a cow barely four years old has just been made on Bunbury Farm. This is the highest record for a cow under full age for the Maritime and the second highest for any age. The value of the record is enhanced by the fact that she carried a calf seven and one half months of the test. She gave 24,586 lbs. of milk. She milked as much as 103 lbs. milk in one day and average over 96 lbs. daily for 30 days. One R. O. P. inspector got 200 1/2 lb. milk testing 3.4% in two days. She was milked three times daily, except during the official test for thirty days when she was milked four times.

## Outdoos Prophets of The World's End

FOUNDER OF NEW UNIVERSAL RELIGION HAS EXCITED CHINA—WEIRD IDEAS CIRCULATED—GOVERNMENT STOPPED PROPAGANDA AND THREATS OF WOE.

TORONTO, April 19.—A new Universal Religion, so-called, has originated in Western China, but the reproduction abroad of its literature has been checked by the Chinese Government and first accounts of its bizarre conceptions are given in an article received here from Rev. Dr. Stewart, of the Canadian Methodist Mission, Vice-President of West China Union University.

Pierce rebukes to kings, capitalists and Christians feature its propaganda. Its founder, a sallow-faced, neurotic man, announced the end of the world and the falsification of his hopes for a gory epoch has to some extent checked his influence.

Times of turmoil in ancient Israel called forth her prophets true and false. It would be passing strange if history did not repeat itself in modern China. In recent years few names have been more widely known and the sayings of few more widely discussed than those of Tang Hwang, Chang of our own capital, Chengtu. News items in the daily press from all parts of China tell the same story of his messenger, their message and the menace aroused thereby.

Surprised at the success of his propaganda, Tang or his followers had his statement translated into English and were sending it forth to various foreign lands, when suddenly stopped by the authorities. Now that the fatal events fixed for September 25th last are long since past, we have published all his weird words, of which some excerpts are included in this article.

Ejected From Church.  
Tang himself is of very sallow complexion, due possibly to opium smoking, has little regard for cleanliness, and rambles on and on in his talking, coming apparently to himself again with a sudden start and twitch. He once came in contact with Christian religious teaching in Tzechow and Chengtu, but was ejected for irregularities on life and life. Finally, he received, so he says, a revelation from God, that he was selected as the one worthy to open the "seventh seal."

His was to be the final revelation for which Judaism, Taoism, Confucianism, Buddhism, Christianity and Mohammedanism had all been parties and preparatory. He calls him the Universal Religion, Li-mien Lu-yin, or "Inner Gospel." His teaching is silly. He attempts to answer Matthew on over-population by simply demanding that all stop marrying and Marx's appeals against poverty by naively suggesting that all observe forty days fasting. I will summarize his central announcement to the world and quote from it.

No More Electricity.  
On or about the fifteenth day of the fifth moon, September 25, 1923, the world was to experience an earthquake affecting all nations, an eclipse of the sun and moon which would also turn off all electric lights (sic), also an universal catastrophe "specially fixed for killing people, a thunderclap which would hurl ballistones like bows, and a number of stars would bounce against the world.

Many angels and "heaven soldiers" ten thousand or one hundred thousand times as many as those in the recent European war will pile up the corpses mountains high. He goes on to say, "It is really very miserable and no ordinary calamity." But he finds people go on playing dominoes or poker, heedless.

So he issued specific and special warnings to many classes, kings and presidents, soldiers, scientists, capitalists and laborers, and then to the religions, each fierce message starting with "You may awake from your dream now."  
Kings and soldiers are rebuked for their killings, capitalists for making wars, workers for revolution.
