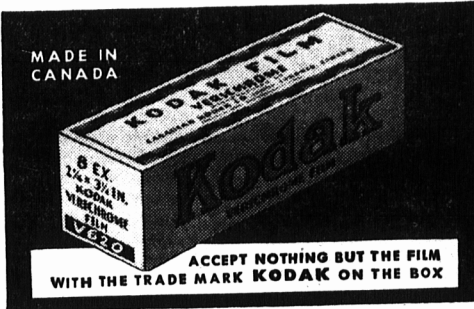

Senate And Commons To Meet June 29th In "Free Conference"

The following is from the Hansard report of the debates in the Senate, June 24:

Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Bill

Proposed Conference With House Of Commons

The Hon. the Speaker: Honourable senators, a message has been received from the House of Commons reading as follows: Resolved that a message be sent to the Senate requesting a Free Conference with Their Honours to consider certain amendments made by the Senate to Bill No. 25, intitled, An Act to amend the Farmers' Creditors Arrangement Act, 1934, to which this House disagrees and upon which the Senate insists; that the Senate have named the Honourable Senators Beaubien, Dandurand, Haig and Meighan as managers on their part at the Free Conference.

"Also that the Managers of the Free Conference on the part of the Senate will meet in Senate Committee Room 258, at 2.30 o'clock p.m. on Wednesday, June 29."

Right Hon. Mr. Meighan: Honourable senators, I am of course quite agreeable to the conference. But I must express disappointment that the honourable gentleman from King's (Hon. Mr. Hughes) is not one of the Managers.

Hon. Mr. Dandurand: The House of Commons had suggested three Managers and we have named four. I thought we should stop there.

The motion was agreed to.

NEWFOUNDLAND TO IMPORT RABBITS

(By The Canadian Press)

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., June 28—The Newfoundland Commission of Government has under consideration proposals for the importation of experimental breeding purposes of a certain type of English rabbits. These rabbits, valuable from the standpoint of fur and wool, would be kept in captivity and bred in the first instance at the experimental farm. Should the undertaking prove successful, the intention is to distribute them in the same manner as the mink.

The government is desirous of this result of inquiries to be undertaken.

"In Defence of Freedom of the Press"

AWARDED BY COLUMBIA UNIVERSITY TO THE EDMONTON JOURNAL FOR ITS LEADERSHIP IN DEFENSE OF THE FREEDOM OF THE PRESS IN ALBERTA 1938

Illustrated above is the bronze plaque recently awarded by the advisory board of the Columbia University graduate school of Journalism to Edmonton Journal "for its leadership in defence of the freedom of the press in Alberta." The award, first Pulitzer prize ever to be bestowed outside United States, was in recognition of THE JOURNAL'S part in combating the Alberta Press Act, passed by the Social Credit government in 1937 and later declared unconstitutional by the supreme court of Canada. Other daily and weekly newspapers of Alberta which joined in the fight against the Press Act were awarded certificates to mark their public service.
