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REBEL MOVEMENT CRUSHED IN SPAIN

"GUN - GIRL" HUNTED BY PARIS POLICE

ASSASSINATION WAS CAREFULLY PLANNED

Fugitive Suspect Is Alleged To Have Confessed to Part In Crime.

PARIS, Oct. 12.—A beautiful young woman police described as the "gun girl" for the assassin of King Alexander of Yugoslavia was sought tonight as police in France and over Europe trailed an international terror ring.

Believing the gang, with headquarters in Hungary, seeks the death of all Europe's rulers, the French police formally charged Zvonimir Topcic, Yugoslav expatriate and fugitive from justice, with complicity in the Marseille murders.

Advices from Geneva said Yugoslav delegates to the League of Nations had reports from persons present at Annemasse today when Topcic and Ivan Raichich, his fellow suspect, were grilled that the latter confessed he went to Paris to await orders for Alexander's slaying.

A fourth suspect, one Quinquarrel Delaunay of Austria, who was taken today near Chermery as he attempted to cross the border into Italy afoot through an Alpine pass was released tonight after he convinced police his presence at Aix-en-Provence was innocent.

The hunt for the "gun girl"—the young woman police believe brought the pistols to Petrus Kalem, the assassin, who also stayed at Aix—was being pushed vigorously tonight.

Police said she reached Aix Sunday night with four valises, one of which police believed contained the death-dealing guns Kalem used. Three persons were known to have visited her, and the description of

Cabaret Dancer Faces Charge Of Murder

INVESTIGATORS BAFFLED BY EXPLOSION

Police Fail To Find Clue To Fire Which Claimed Six Lives.

By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, Oct. 12.—A maze of baffling confusions investigators tonight still sought some clue to tell them whether or not a deliberate human agency was responsible for the explosion that sent six persons to a flaming death in the wreckage of their home yesterday morning.

From the ruins of the three-story structure had come no indication pointing to the source of the explosion—nothing to prove or blow up the theory that an enemy dived the blast to "get even" with Daniel Dudas, the Russian storekeeper who lost three of his family in the holocaust.

And from questioning of more than a score of witnesses had come nothing more which would indicate with any degree of certainty foul play or accident wiped out the building. A vague threat against Dudas, statements and a denial that there were explosives in the building, confronted the investigators along with other puzzling aspects as they went on with their probe.

The Russian himself had felt a premonition of "trouble," he confided to a friend after learning of the death of his wife and two children. "They planted run on me one time; they poisoned my dog, and now this!" Bert Brian quoted him as saying when he heard the news of the explosion as he returned to his home from Annapolis Valley yesterday morning.

Tubers Rival Pumpkins

H., Oct. 12.—Potatoes in northern New Hampshire will soon rival pumpkins, according to the 1934 crop figures given out today by the New Hampshire extension service. Primate Of Greek Church In Latvia Brutally Slain

The police were unable to trace the assassin but said they were convinced his murder and the case were in some way connected. As the Primate of the Greek Orthodox Church in Latvia, Archbishop Pommer was the spiritual mentor of about 10 percent of the populace. INCREASE IN CANADA'S FOREIGN TRADE

Shipping Activity Barometer of Dominion's Expanding Trade.
