POULTRY NEWS FOR POULTRYMEN

(From Yesterday's Evening Guardian)

The New York Agricultural Experiment Station has recently issued a valuable bulletin containing an account of experiments with poultry extending over a period of nineteen years.

The following are some of the results obtained. A little oil-cake fed in the Autumn will hasten the period of moult.

Oyster shell and broken glass should always be in reach of the hen if she is to produce the greatest number possible of eggs. Hens that were fed from one to five ounces of salt per day per 100 hens laid much better than hens that did not get a salt. Nearly 11 per cent more eggs were obtained from hens from which the male birds were excluded than from hens with which they were allowed to run.

For laying hens, and male food is almost necessary. It can be supplied in milk or cut meat and bone. Good sharp grit is as necessary as food. The bulletin is a valuable one and those who do not happen to have a copy, should make it a point to attend some of Mr. Benson's meetings. He is a practical man who has had a lot of experience.

The State of Oregon is giving particular attention to the encouragement of the poultry industry at the present time. Recently a Poultry Contest was arranged for the City of Portland, in which 28 children between the ages of twelve and eighteen entered. A scale of points was prepared which took into consideration record-keeping, business methods, in marketing, completion of a reading course, as well as what would be generally expected such as yield, cleanliness, etc., etc. The report of this Contest brings out much interesting information in regard to the winter production of eggs, the value of pure bred stock and the best methods of feeding.

The unusually high price of eggs makes reports of this kind very valuable.

T. A. Benson is now in the Province lecturing right along this line. He speaks on October 28th, at Heatherdale Hall, at 7.30 p. m. Oct. 29th, at Whim Road Cross Hall at 7.30 p. m., and on October 31st, at Lower Montague Hall at 7.30 p. m.

At the poultry meeting held at Roseneath on Monday evening, Mr. Benson Poultry Expert, pointed out that too much glass in the front of the poultry was not good. Glass is a good conductor of heat, that is it passes heat through it readily; the result is that it cools down rapidly.

giving extremes of heat and cold, which is very bad. There must be sufficient glass to supply plenty of light, but not more. Many houses could be made much warmer by taking out a window frame and putting cotton over it. Cotton is a poor conductor of heat, so that it conserves the heat of the day for the night. Mr. Benson speaks on Friday at St. Mary's Road School, and on Monday at Heatherdale Hall.
