Billy Cope And Lucky Lindy In Great Battle

Two of Island's Fastest Steppers Thrill Thousands At New Annan Yesterday; Billy Getting The Verdict—Bingen Aubrey And Great Village Bell Other Winners.

The races at the New Annan Track yesterday were a great success, about 5,000 people were present, the weather was clear and fine up until the close when a shower or two of rain occurred. The usual specialties in the programme attracted a vast crowd. The horse races were unusually good, the time made in two of the classes being rather exceptional for the course. A great deal of interest was taken in the meeting of the half-brothers, Billy Cope and Lucky Lindy, people from the far western part of the province, where these horses were reared being present in large numbers. Lucky Lindy had an unbroken series of victories this year and was known to possess extraordinary speed. Billy Cope was highly thought of, so naturally every one was expecting a great contest.

In the first heat the horses went away very fast, Lucky made a jump and broke both his hobbles. Under the rules he was distanced but the judges allowed him to start again. This heat was won by Billy Cope with a good American trotter, Peter Dawes, close second, Hal Tipton third.

Second heat, Billy Cope and Lucky Lindy went away very fast, covering the first half in 1.05 and the three quarter mile in 1.39, both horses on even terms, then Billy Cope drew away from Lindy and finished with a length to the good.

The third heat, Peter Dawes took the lead, was passed at the one quarter by Billy Cope. A great battle took place between Billy Cope and Lucky Lindy, but Billy proved to be the better by winning comfortably by over a length. Time 2:13 1-2.

The 2:18 Class. This was won by Bingen Aubrey in straight heats, with Marge Direct, Con Frisco, Watts Edition, British Ginger and Peter Will Tell fighting for places. Con Frisco finished second in two heats and Marge Direct second in the second heat. Con Frisco is said to be the best trotter ever brought to the Maritime Provinces and has a record of 2:07 1-2 made over a half mile track last year. He put up a great battle in the third heat being only beaten by a length. Marge Direct and Watts Edition also were good. Time in all these heats was very fast.

The 2:27 trot and pace had 7 starters and when four heats had been run a winner was finally decided. Baretta Aubrey, Louis Set and Great Village Belle, each winning a heat. The fourth and final heat being won by Great Village Belle. We regret the late hour prevents a more extended report of the races.

FRUIT CUP DESSERT (Serves Six) One cup orange pieces, 1 cup diced pineapple, 1 cup halved strawberries (or white grapes), 1/2 cup powdered sugar, 6 maraschino cherries. Combine fruits and sugar. Serve very cold in sherbet glasses with a maraschino cherry for garnish.

LEMON FRUIT SHERBET (Makes 2 Quarts—Serves 16) One-quarter cup orange juice, 1/2 cup lemon juice, 2 1/2 cups sugar, 1 quart milk, 1 cup any one of following fruits: crushed strawberries, crushed raspberries, apricot pulp, mashed peaches, mashed bananas. Mix and freeze. If mixture curdles it will freeze smooth again.

PEACH COBBLER Line a deep dish with pastry and peel a d halve enough peaches to fill it. Put in the center a small cup for the juice to collect under so that the bottom crust will not be heavy; lay the fruit around it, frequently putting in one of the pits of the peaches to improve the flavor. Add 1 teacup of sugar and cover with a thick crust.
