**German Government Is Declared Responsible**  
LONDON, July 10.—The German Government itself is responsible for the depreciation of Germany's currency, is the finding of the Reichstag's committee of inquiry which issued its report today, says a Central News despatch from Berlin. The report, adds the message, says the collapse of the mark was particularly due to extensive purchases of foreign coal by the railway administration without notifying the Reichsbank or other authorities.

**TO RETAIN RIFLE RANGES**  
OTTAWA, July 10.—A special committee of the Ottawa field naturalists' club has recommended to their council that the federal Government be urged to retain the Reich life rifle ranges site, for the purpose of establishing a national botanical and zoological garden for the benefit of the people of Canada.

**CANADIAN BUILDING**  
LONDON, July 10.—Plant for the construction of the Canadian building for the British Empire Exhibition was installed on the ground today, and work on the building will commence tomorrow. Australia and India are the only other participants who have already made beginning and there is considerable rivalry for the honor of finishing first. Details of the exhibits are being kept more or less secret, since each Dominion is inspired with a laudable ambition to outdo the others.

Batting and fielding by both teams was good and at times there were brilliant flashes of play on both sides. These two clubs have only lately been organized and with a little more practice we may expect to see some very interesting baseball.

It is scarcely fair to individualize where every member of both teams did some excellent work, but we might mention the stellar play of H. Dickleson and Harold Steyenson of the Victors and L. Chandler and Charles Andrews of the Whizbangs. These players were right there with the goods. The game was umpired to the satisfaction of all by the Rev. H. Marsh.

**Turkey Wants Great Britain to Remove Her Warships**  
LAUSANNE, July 10.—Turkey wants Great Britain to remove her warships from Turkish waters, since it is within six weeks after the ratification of the peace treaty by the Angora Government. The warships of France and Italy must also go, Ismet Pasha declares so that Ottoman subjects may be freed of all this evidence of foreign dominion.

The Allied representatives have referred the question to their home Governments. It is presumed that Great Britain will agree to a reduction in the number of ships, but will decline to withdraw all of them, pending general ratification of the Straits convention which fixes the number of warships which may pass through the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus.

The protocol on concessions which will be attached to the treaty, provides that in case the Chester Company abandons parts of its contracts and decides not to build additional railways, Turkey will give an option to the British and French companies enjoying pre-war rights.

**"CROSSED WIRES"**  
Prize-Winning Comedy-Drama

New York prides itself on controlling all the plays that are produced in America. It looks them over first, and when it is through with them it lets the rest of the country have a look at them. But for once the rest of the country has turned the tables. "Crossed Wires," the winner of the Chautauqua Prize Play Contest, which will be seen here as a regular part of the Chautauqua program cannot be produced on a Broadway, according to the terms of the contest, until after it has been played all summer over the Chautauqua circuits.

A year ago the leaders of the Chautauqua movement got together and decided that Chautauqua was big enough to have its own plays and not have its own plays and not use Broadway's cast-offs. They therefore decided to offer a prize of \$3,000 for an original play of American life written by an American author. More than 300 plays were submitted, and after careful reading of them all by the judges, "Crossed Wires" was selected as the winner of the prize. It was produced by a competent cast and presented before a large audience of critics before the opening of the Chautauqua season. It proved to be an overwhelming success and just what was wanted for production as the Chautauqua play.

The author of the winning play is Richard A. Purdy who is the author of several other plays and poems. A poem of his entitled "The Day" was published during the war and was much discussed in literary and patriotic circles, being classed with "In Flanders Fields" as one of the best poems written during the war.

In "Crossed Wires" Mr. Purdy tells a story that comes into the actual experience of many American boys. His principal characters are two boys with ambition. One of them wants to be newspaper editor, but instead is forced to run the dry goods business which his father started. The other wants to be a dry goods merchant, but finds himself forced by his father into being a newspaper man. They realize that they are "Crossed Wires" and make up their minds that they will get the wires uncrossed so that they work. How they go about accomplishing their purpose forms a story that is full of laughable situations and amusing characters from beginning to end. Incidentally they both find that life is not complete without romance, and before the final curtain falls, wedding bells are in the air for two happy couples.
