dominated during the past week. The unbroken decline on the stock market had a dampening effect on sentiment. Seasonal activity in retail trade was hampered by a spell of warm weather. Railroad earnings continued disappointing in comparison with a year ago. The general level of business activity was low as reflected by the volume of bank clearings and the contraction in imports and exports. A moderately favorable feature was the indication that Canada's advantage trade balance was being reversed, this being accompanied by cutting of imports to a larger extent than exports. A large number of corporations declared regular dividends, including Quebec Power, and this was favorably received. Judging by the annual report of B. C. Power Corp. and a statement issued by Montreal Power for the first 8 months of this year, quite a number of companies have been quite successful in maintaining earnings. There is nothing in the situation at present to indicate whether business recovery in Canada is a matter of the near future or whether it will be a considerable time in being realized. There is no reason, however, to lose confidence in the ultimate future.

FAVORABLE FACTORS IN WHEAT SITUATION A number of favorable factors in the world wheat situation are outlined in a study prepared by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. It is pointed out that as far as Europe is concerned the period of high prices of the past few years has not induced any appreciable increase in wheat average in normally importing countries. On the other hand there is the possibility of a large contraction in wheat average in the United States, the Argentine and Australia. Moreover, the surplus of wheat in Canada is over normal carryovers will be substantially reduced in the next 12 months. Recent low prices, also, have stimulated consumption of wheat.

Livestock Market (Canadian Press, Sept. 22.) There were 191 cattle, 93 calves, 543 hogs and 190 sheep and lambs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today, including about 80 cattle held over from yesterday's markets. Plain to just fair quality butcher cows sold between \$2.25 and \$1.00. Common bulls were mostly \$2. The bulk of the steers offered for sale brought between \$3.50 and \$4.50, with good steers selling up to \$5.50 and 15 head were picked out for export at \$6. A total of 1,003 cattle were received for export to Great Britain. 449 head left today on the Melmore and 554 were leaving on the Concordia for Birkenhead, from Quebec. In addition, 328 cattle were received making part of consignments to leave later in the week, on the Manchester Producer and the Althra. There were only 93 calves and these were common to medium quality veals, selling from \$5.50 to \$7.00. Good ewes and wethers were steady at \$6. Culls and bucks were discounted \$2 per cwt. The ruling price for hams, butchers and lights were \$6 fed and watered. Sows were mostly \$8. When sold on grade, hams brought \$1 per hog premium.

Thomas To Fight He Tells Friends LONDON, Sept. 22—"Can you imagine that, when in the past I fought with my coat off for the railwaymen's wives and families, I am not going to do the same for my own wife and family?" Mr. Thomas said in the letter which Right Hon. J. H. Thomas, Secretary for the Dominions, sent to the Cardiff railwaymen's executive yesterday. The letter was in reply to a message from the Cardiff railwaymen stating they would continue to support Mr. Thomas and condemning the action of the national executive in depriving Mr. Thomas of the General Secretaryship of the union which he held for nearly a quarter of a century. "I have been engaged in too many battles to take the injustice lying down," Mr. Thomas said. "What a different complexion would be revealed, if I was able, as in the old days, to meet the men and tell them the real facts. But I am ground down to a hard, difficult and delicate task."
