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## EARTH SHOCK PUTS SEISMOGRAPHS OUT OF USE

### TREMOR WORST EXPERIENCED IN VARIOUS MARITIME CITIES

#### Near Panic Results In Business Places As The Earth Trembles & Shakes

Maritimes Severely Shaken—Sydney And St. John's Nfld., Experience Marked Severity Of Tremors—Reminiscences Of Tragic Explosion In Halifax Were In The Air—Little Damage Reported.

HALIFAX, N. S., Nov. 18—An earth shock of such intensity that the Seismograph at Dalhousie University was thrown out of order, shook Halifax and was general throughout Nova Scotia between four and five o'clock, Atlantic Standard Time, this afternoon. The shock, which was the heaviest by far ever experienced here, was quite severe as far as St. John's, Nfld., and is reported to have been felt slightly at Boston. There was no known damage in Halifax or provincial points, though staffs in large office buildings here were thrown into a near panic and several persons fainted. At the height of the tremor, buildings shook noticeably for more than a minute. On account of damage to the seismograph, it was impossible to determine the centre of the disturbance.

The shock began at 4.32 Atlantic Standard time, reached its highest intensity soon after, and was traceable for over two hours.

#### Revenue For Tonnage Loaded In Maritimes August Last A Record-Breaker For The Last Nine Years, According To A Report Issued by Transportation Commission.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 18—Revenue for the tonnage loaded at all stations in the Maritime Provinces during August of this year reached the highest total for that month in the last nine years, according to a report just issued by the Transportation Commission of the Maritime Board of Trade. The aggregate for August was 991,333 tons, as compared with 979,281 for August, 1928, which was then a high mark; the average for the month during the last nine years since 1921 was 748,733 tons.

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#### BLOODSHED, BUT NO DISTURBANCE

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 18.—Bloodshed in several cities, but no general rioting attended today the election of a new president of Mexico. By evening twelve had been reported killed, and many more wounded, both in the Capital and other cities of the country. Voting on the whole was orderly and fairly heavy. The candidates were Pascual Ortiz Rubio of the National Revolutionary Party, of the same political organization as former President Calles and the late General Obregon, Jose Vasconcelos a lawyer, nominated by the anti-revolutionary party, and General Pedro Rodriguez Triana, candidate of the Workers and Peasants Bloc, which is allied with the Communists. The choice of the voters will probably not be known for some time.

#### Green Foxes From Paris

#### INCREASE Lower Freight Rates On Mill Feeds Sought

WINNIPEG, Man., Nov. 18.—Western Canada visible wheat supply on November 15 of this year showed an increase of more than twenty-five million bushels over that of a year ago. Where the visible supply of Western wheat on November 15, 1928 was 133,345,465 bushels, it had amounted to 158,886,307 bushels on the same date this year, according to a statistical report issued today by the Board of Grain Commissioners for Canada. Similar increases in the visible supply of other grains were also noted with the exception of flax seed. A decline of half a million bushels was noted in the visible flax supply.

He was unconscious throughout the day and hope had been abandoned hours before death occurred at 8.37 p. m. He was 63 years old.

The new craft can cruise half way around the world without refueling; can carry a seaplane; is provided with broadside as well as bow and stern torpedo tubes and has an armored deck to protect against shells and air bombs.

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
