MRS. ROBERT R. DUFFY

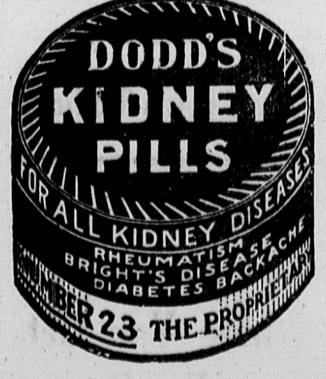
