Canadian Unity

Sir—Mr. Lapointe comes preaching peace and strange, though it may seem, he "unmercifully scores" his opponents as a means to that end. He denounces all who do not agree with him. As a peacemaker he evidently has more faith in vinegar than honey. He that as it may, he harps on the division of class against class, province against province, and race against race, etc. "Borden is the man who has brought this condition about." So far as Borden's influences went that statement is in a sense true. He might have used his influence to have Canada remain united in a manner satisfactory to Mr. Lapointe and Mr. King, but he did not think proper to do so, and to Canada's credit Borden's views were accepted. The position was this and will not be forgotten. War broke out and Britain immediately took up arms against Germany. Borden was not surely to blame for the war or for Britain's action but is answerable for helping to have Canada enter the war and to the full extent of her men and resources. That meant pledging the services of every Canadian, voluntarily if they will, but if not by conscription. Sir Wilfred Laurier and Mr. King too, held different views. They said we are against Germany and hope she will be beaten but we want her to be beaten, if she will be beaten, by those who fought with us against Germany. Borden, however, in the other post view and said all should go and by taking that stand he divided Canada clearly over those opposite views. Had he taken Sir Wilfred's and Mr. King's position on this question he would not be answerable for the division so far as his influence did go. We would not now have Mr. Lapointe and Mr. King holding him up to scorn for disturbing the peace of Canada as the result of his war efforts. Then listening to the sneers and reproaches levelled at Borden for the results of the war and the war debt, the thought comes to one's mind that he could have accomplished fully as much to win the war if he had not asked Quebec to submit to conscription. If the efforts made by the men in that province had been expected in other directions the results would be just as good and Quebec taught that her compulsory services can be dispensed with even if volunteers had to fight for her homes.

Mr. Tom Rogers leaves for Halifax where his marriage takes place on the 21st. He will be accompanied by Mr. Willie Wolan who will be his groom's man. Mr. W. G. Bruce of the Customs leaves this morning for Montreal where he will be married on Wednesday to Miss Gladys M. daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John McFarquhar of Calgary.

STEAMER GUILDFOOD SHORT OF COAL.—The United States shipping board steamer Guildfood reported by wireless from a position 125 miles off Halifax that she only has enough coal to run her within sixty miles of that port, that she is leaking and requires assistance. A tug will be sent to tow her into port. The Guildfood is a steamer of 3,500 tons. She arrived at Norfolk on January 2nd, and is believed to have sailed with a cargo of chemical salts for a transatlantic port.

FIRE DAMAGES STEAMER WAR.—Fire which started Friday afternoon from an unknown cause in the quarters of the crew of the steamer War Period at Sand Point St. John, N. B., considerably damaged the after part of the vessel. The flames were extinguished after a fight of an hour and a quarter by men on the pier. No one was injured. The steamer, which will take on a cargo for London, will not be delayed by the fire.

BIG DRY DOCK FOR VANCOUVER.—The construction of a dry dock in Vancouver, 110 feet in width and 700 feet in length, has been contracted for by the government with J. J. Coughlin and Sons. The dock will be capable of accommodating the largest sea going vessels.

CANADIAN SPINNER AT SYDNEY.—A Sydney Exchange dated January 13 says:—The Canadian Spinner which arrived in Sydney harbor this afternoon and is to-night being bunkered for her voyage off as people would have imagined as a result of her experience of eighteen days' imprisonment in the ice in the Gulf of St. Lawrence. Leaving Quebec on December 16, she immediately encountered heavy ice off of Big Island and drifted into very thick fields of Pointe Chaleur. The steamer could make no headway and was compelled to simply drift with the ice. The steamer was not without fuel at all. However, the captain and chief engineer judged it expedient to economize their bunkers and this was to their eventual advantage for during their long sojourn in the ice they were able to keep up heat without resorting to any wastage of wood fittings. They had plenty of spare wood aboard and this served to help out the coal supply. When the Montcalm got alongside and was ready to give a bunker supply, the Canadian Spinner had still eighteen tons of her original bunkers aboard. Captain Wreath, the master, was never out of touch by wireless, and although the imprisonment was longer than was expected, he never became alarmed. The exposure was at times pretty severe but the crew are all well and quite cheerful after their experience.

Mr. Tate, Superintendent for the Canadian Marine, stated tonight that the Canadian Spinner is not at all seriously damaged and that after bunkering tonight she will proceed early tomorrow to Halifax for full examination and repairs. She will proceed to sea under her own steam and using her repaired rudder.

NORTHCLIFFE PAPERS COQUETING WITH THE BRITISH LABOR PARTY

LONDON, Jan. 17.—The Daily Mail announces that it will pay \$5,000 a week to the workers of a marked and significant degree. This contribution, it is added, is made in recognition of the basic character of any strike which affects the general relations between the employer and employed in a marked and significant degree. The Daily Mail has been coquetting for some time past with labor. Recently it set aside \$50,000 to help a strike at the Army and Navy stores, with the consequence that the directors of the company at once conceded the demands of the strikers.

MEXICANS WANT THE OIL FIELDS

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Jan. 17.—The Government of Mexico has resolved to buy or acquire by condemnation proceedings all oil lands in the zone of 50 kilometres from the frontiers of the nation "that are held by foreigners against the perfectly well defined precepts of the constitution," says a Mexico City despatch to El Tiempo, a Canada newspaper.

"At the same time the executive expects to obtain from Congress a fund of 50,000,000 pesos in gold to buy these properties. It is feared that the owning companies will be unwilling to sell these rich tracts of oil land, but in this case our Government would be forced to expropriate."
