TOXOID IMMUNIZATION—Drs. R. F. Seaman and G. L. Smith gave toxoid immunization against diphtheria to 292 pupils at Prince Street School yesterday morning. Of these 272 received their 3rd treatment and 20 their second. The excellent co-operation of principal and teachers was highly commendable and assisted the doctors and nurses so that these inoculations were run through in one hour. In the afternoon the Pre School Clinic was conducted by Drs. W. J. P. MacMillan and P. A. Creelman when 212 children were given their third treatment, 21 their second and 5 their first inoculations. These numbers included 70 school children who were not present when the doctors visited their schools. In all 530 children were inoculated during the day.

Abitibi

It has been learned from official sources that although it will be a month or so before the financial statement of Abitibi Power and Paper Company covering 1929 will be made public, there is pretty good ground for stating that this statement will prove a satisfactory one to the shareholders.

Some elements of it will probably come as a pleasant surprise. The vice-president and managing director L. R. Wilson, effectively set at rest recently any doubt as to the maintenance of the dividend on the 6 per cent preferred stock. Apparently the decline in this stock to a point where it was showing a return of over nine per cent had been due to some anxiety as to whether the dividend was being earned and its continuance reasonably certain.

Indeed a preliminary estimate, it is understood, shows this dividend as earned between one and a half and two times during 1929. This would indicate somewhere around \$10 and \$11 a share on this stock, of which 248,818 shares are outstanding, an amount equivalent to between \$3,500,000 and \$3,800,000. As the common stock comes after this it follows that a very substantial sum will be shown as available for the junior security.

The 1929 statement, it is said, will show a good increase in earnings over the previous year and in addition will indicate a very strong working capital position.

Stock Ownership

The great increase in the number of stockholders ranging from 20 to 35% reported since the "break" by the leading corporations of the country may be interpreted as a swing away from speculation toward bona fide investment. It doubtless represents not only the buying for more or less permanent holding of the shares of our industrial giants at the favourable prices at which they have been selling, but also a tendency on the part of those who bought them at higher levels to forget their paper losses, transfer the stock to their own name and await ultimate recovery. Such broad ownership as is now current is strong attestation of widespread faith in the ultimate destiny of Canadian business and in the great organizations which move in its vanguard.

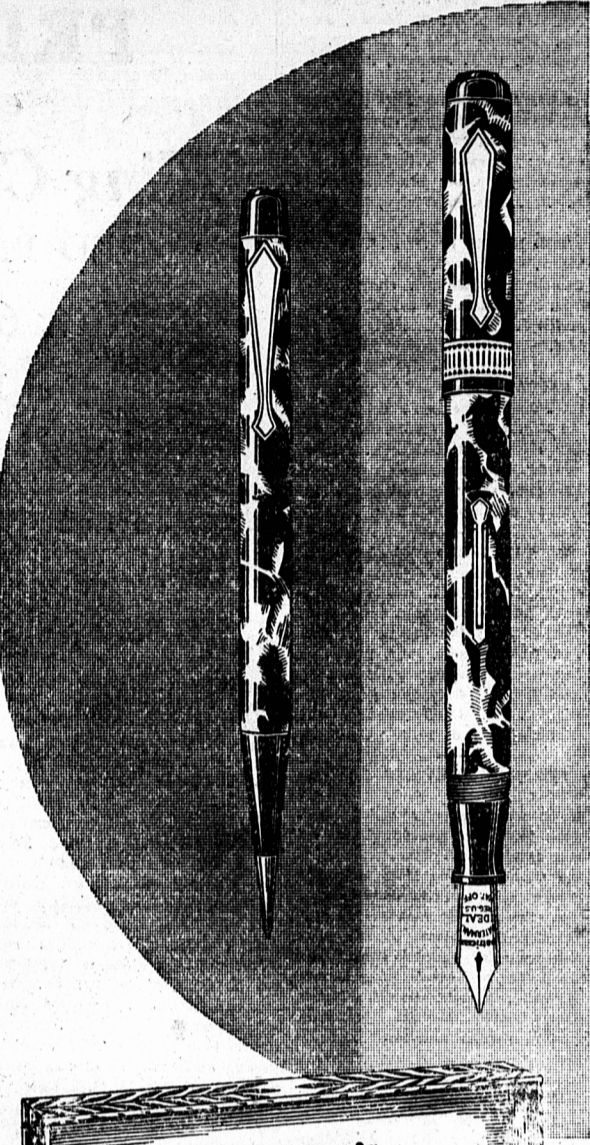
