### Islanders I Have Met

By Islander Abroad

WINNIPEG, Man. (Special) — Last Thursday evening, we were entertained at dinner by Mrs. Iona MacLeod and her son Melvin at their suite on Canora St. After dinner was over and we had retired to the living room, we were joined by Mr. and Mrs. Howard MacIntosh, former Islanders, who called upon invitation, to wife away a few hours in chit-chat of Island memories. So much was there to talk about and so much ground to cover, discovering that I knew relatives and friends on both sides of the family, that Mr. and Mrs. MacIntosh invited us to attend a dinner at their home on Monday evening.

Last evening we were well entertained with other friends from the Island, in the MacIntosh home, where the father and mother were ably assisted in the entertaining by two of their children Catherine, who is employed at the head office of the Bank of Montreal in Winnipeg, and Ian, who is attending the Gordon Bell High School. Ian is Cadet Capt. of his school and was chosen by examinations as Cadet Major over two thousand cadets which train a Clear Lake, Man., during the summer months.

Mr. MacIntosh is the son of the late Malcolm and Mary MacIntosh of Freetown, P. E. I., and has two brothers, Dr. C. W. MacIntosh, veterinary, on research with the Canadian Govt., Ottawa, and Ernest in Trail, B. C., also one sister, Mrs. D. W. Howard in Calgary, Alberta.

Mr. MacIntosh was overseas in the first World War with the 8th. Sedge Battery, and saw action at Passendale and all major battles following. In 1940 Mr. MacIntosh joined up for World War II and was for a time with the artillery. Afterwards he was appointed quartermaster of the Directorate of Inter-Services, Research and Development—the duties being to go north and test clothing, arms and vehicles etc. These services were in Canada.

Mrs. MacIntosh, the former Ethel Morrison, is the daughter of the late George and Katie (MacLeod) Morrison of Breadalbane, P. E. I., and has three brothers, Allan and Daniel, manager of The Bank of Commerce, Moncton, N. B., and two sisters, Mrs. Allan MacLean, Moncton, N. B., and Mrs. Alvin Steves, Boston, Mass.

Mr. and Mrs. MacIntosh have another son, Major Howard of Saskatoon, Sask., who acquitted himself nobly in the services of the last war. He was a member of the First Special Service Force—the first joint force of its kind, made up of Americans and Canadians.

The First Special Service Force was something unique, and little heard about during war activities. This force played a major part in theatres of war as Kiska in the Aleutians campaign in the Pacific theatre; Monte la Difensa, Monte la Rametanea, Monte Majo, Anzio Beachhead, Monte Arrestino and others in the Naples-Toggia Campaign in the Mediterranean theatre; also in the same theatre (Mediterranean) Rome in the Rome-Arno campaign, Iles d'Hyeres Villeneuve-Loubet, Venice, Mentone, and others in the Southern France Campaign; Franco-Belgian border in the Rhineland Campaign in the European Theatre.

Major Howard MacIntosh was in all these theatres of war and was wounded four times, and received a letter of commendation from Mark W. Clark, Lt. Gen. Commanding. Mr. MacIntosh is mentioned several times in "The First Special Service Force"—a War History of The North American 1942-1944 by Lt. Col. Robert D. Burman; and is the only original Canadian Combat officer of the force to return.

The F.S.S.F. captured the first "little Goliath", a self propelled tank like affair, filled with explosives, which the Germans invented, while on their first offensive warfare in Italy. Major MacIntosh was one of the group, in fact, was commanding the group, which made this capture. Major MacIntosh is now employed with the Monarch Life Insurance Co.

### Opening Speeches In Draft Address Debate

#### House Applauds Maiden Efforts Of Messrs. Keir Clark And C. W. Delaney In Moving And Seconding Reply To Throne Speech

Voicing what was evidently the unanimous opinion of the House, both Premier Jones and Hon. Dr. MacMillan, leader of the Opposition, tendered their congratulations to Messrs. Keir Clark, Third King's, and C. W. Delaney, Fifth Prince, on their speeches in moving and seconding the Address in reply to the Speech from the Throne in the Legislature on Wednesday. Both speeches were maiden efforts by newly elected members, and were commended for their moderation and good sense.

Mr. Clark congratulated the Premier on his victory at the polls on Dec. 11 last. The fact that he was made "the subject of a bitter personal attack from the editor of a former Liberal newspaper" made his victory all the more impressive. Congratulations were also tendered to the leader of the Opposition on the recent honour conferred upon him by the Pope.

Farm production at the present time, Mr. Clark said, is at an all-time high. While the price of potatoes is quite satisfactory, one must reserve a note of caution with regard to the quantity still on hand, which is probably in excess of three million bushels. This was due to the lack of refrigerator cars. In hog production, recent losses due to high feed costs have been overcome and the industry is now stabilized, a condition brought about in large measure by agreement between the British Government and the Dominion authorities in raising the export bacon price.

Prices of feeds, Mr. Clark noted, are apparently on the down-grade and the prospects of farm producers are much brighter.

The threatened tie-up of production at the local packing plant due to strike conditions had been averted by the "prompt and courageous action" of the Jones Government in taking over the plant.

"I believe most of our farmers appreciate the action taken," Mr. Clark said, "and I hope that the proposed legislation may provide the machinery to prevent future strikes which might be disastrous to our farmers or fishermen."

Labour, he added, is entitled to protection, but the laborers must not forget that they are first and foremost Prince Edward Islanders. They must not take any action that will injure our basic producers at the dictates of labour union bosses in Montreal, Toronto or elsewhere.

The speaker commended the Government's action in assisting in the establishment of a cucumber pickling plant. He believed it would be advantageous to encourage other industries of this kind, based on agriculture. Much more processing of farm products could be done particularly in the canning line. In this connection he voiced regret at the loss of the Horton plant at Murray River. It was one of the finest of its kind in the Province, employing between 30 and 40 persons besides providing markets for the products of Island farmers and fishermen.

"We should," Mr. Clark maintained, "be shipping out of this Province hundreds of carloads of canned fruits and vegetables annually. I think this matter should receive more consideration from the Department of Agriculture and the Legislature generally."

He noted with satisfaction that forestry is to receive more attention. Trees have been "ruthlessly cut down" in this Province, "whole sections of wood at a time." This practice must be discontinued. "The best way of saving the forests we now have is to see that they are cut properly."

Municipal Needs

Mr. Clark commended the introduction of a Municipality Act as a necessary preliminary to town planning, also the Government's action in passing on to the towns \$1.00 per population from the Federal subsidies. Further assistance, however was needed. One of the chief difficulties of the towns was in maintaining their streets. These streets formed a part of the provincial highway system and should be looked after by the Provincial Government.

The towns were also handicapped by lack of police facilities, Mr. Clark said. Populations under 1,000 are unable to obtain the services of the R. C. M. P., and the Province should take over police duties in these cases. A new Act to "tie in the towns" with the
