DETROIT, March 27.—(AP)—Toronto's flying Maple Leafs, needing only one more victory to enter the Stanley Cup finals for the first time since 1917, will engage Detroit Red Wings here tomorrow night in the second game of their play-off series.

The Leafs slipped a 2-1 defeat on Detroit at Toronto last night. If they win here, the Wings are eliminated from the play-offs and the Leafs will engage the winner of the Boston Bruins-New York Ranger series with hockey's most coveted trophy at stake.

Should the Red Wings even the series, the teams return to Toronto for the deciding game Saturday night.

One thing appeared certain—the Leafs will enter the game here with more respect for the Detroit Club than they had before last night's close encounter.

"The Leafs expected to win by four goals," said Manager Jack Adams of the Red Wings when the Leafs returned here today. "They had trouble winning by one goal and I think we can reverse that score Thursday."

Although the season is fast drawing to a close nevertheless hockey still holds the spotlight at the Forum and closing out this week will be two games that should draw plenty of interest.

On Friday night York Rangers tangle with Milton Hornets in a game that is expected to produce fireworks and fast skating action all the way through, York a young team full of fight all the time are expected to give their more experienced opponents a battle of it all.

But one of the tiddlers of the entire season is scheduled for Saturday night when St. Dunstan's University, New Brunswick-Prince Edward Island intercollegiate champions tangle with Prince of Wales for the Island intercollegiate title.

Saints heavy favorites to win the first game were forced to come from behind on that occasion to earn their draw. Since that time team management have evidently failed to agree on when the series would be resumed but now everything appears rose hued and the game on Saturday night will take on a sudden death tint with the winners being declared champions for the season.

This game is a natural and one of the season's biggest crowds, augmented by students from both seats of learning will be on hand for the game.

Phillies Hope For Better 1940 Team

It's no fault of the doctor who, baseball men will tell you, is a fine manager. You can't build a mansion out of old planks or immature saplings, and through lack of farm connections and, apparently, money, that is what Prothro is forced to try to do.

He has about four ball players above the average in ability. The rest are either old or young, tried too much or tried too little, with a sprinkling of good journeyman players who can hold a job but couldn't win a championship.

The four standbys are pitchers Hugh Mulcahy and Kirby Higbe; outfielder Morrie who played the first three months last year, and Merrill May, dependable third baseman.

Added to this group of tried players are such veterans as pitcher Johnson, boys, Syl and Si, pitchers Hugh Mulcahy, Beech, first baseman Gus Suhr, and catcher Walter Millies.

However, it is on three youngsters that Prothro is basing his hope of finishing before dark. They are Dan Littwiler, an outfielder poked up while roaming free; Robert Brant, a shortstop who, right now looks like the prize of the camp, and Ed Lev, first baseman for whom the Phillies put up \$15,000, conditionally, last year with Newark, and at one time was looked upon as Gehrig's possible successor.

Joe Louis And Johnny Paychek Both Positive Of Victory Friday Night

Associated Press Sports Writer NEW YORK, March 27.—(AP)—School let out today for Joe Louis and Johnny Paychek, with each positive he'd walk out of Madison Square Garden's ring Friday night wearing the crown of the world's heavyweight champion.

Louis wound up training with four rounds of boxing against three sparring partners, placing particular emphasis on getting his training camp "ready" with Clarence Brown, a pretty-good Chicago boxer who has taken some sparring liberties with the "bossman" in recent workouts.

Afterward, the Iowa figure as how he'd have a better chance to flatten Joe "somewhere inside the first five rounds" than he would of outpointing him.

He let the folks in on a secret—that he once boxed with the bomber, when Louis was training for a fight in Chicago with Lee Remage in 1935.

"We went two rounds," he recalled. "And I remember that I could jab and hit him with right hands. In fact, we both scored with rights, and I drew blood from Joe's nose."

For Friday's tussle Johnny figures he can tag Louis with a right hand "coming in" some time in the early rounds. "And I think I have the same chance to do that," he said. "If I hit him, I'll set him on his pants."

In spite of Johnny's confidence, the betting fraternity wasn't at all convinced. They still figured Louis was 1 to 8 to win.

Millionaires Will Leave For Toronto
