Hon. J. D. Stewart, then asked a question re provincial subsidies, the answer to which is made elsewhere.

Hon. J. D. Stewart asked the Minister of Public Works:—

- 1. Have any contract or contracts been entered into by the Government for the supply of gravel?
2. If so, with whom were such contracts made?
3. Table all such contracts.

The Minister of Public Works in reply tabled the following information:—

In April last, tenders were called for gravel. Hereto annexed is a copy of Tender Notice specification and list of tenders received. The tender of H. J. Phillips was accepted and he delivered at various points in the province 16,758 7-10 tons at \$2.75 per ton. f.o.b. at points of delivery, amounting to \$46,085.42. Amount paid on account during 1928 was \$39,983.54.

There were also purchased from various other parties 3,094 tons of gravel at a cost of \$6,235.02. This gravel was not up to the standard of the specification.

List of tenders received for gravel: McLeod, McKensie and Proft, French River, \$3.15 per ton. S. Norman Garton, St. John, N. B., \$2.95 per ton. H. J. Phillips, Charlottetown, \$2.75 per ton 1st year and \$2.65 per ton 2nd and 3rd years.

- 1. What was the total cost of repairs of and extras for all motor vehicles and machines (including road machines) from January 1st, 1928 to this date?
2. How much has been paid thereon? How much is owing and unpaid?
3. Give a list of persons to whom paid or owing and the amounts paid or owing to each.
4. What was the total amount paid for or on behalf of the Government for salaries, wages or remuneration to persons for operating or in any way attending motor vehicles and machines from January 1st, 1928 to this date? How much, if anything, is still unpaid thereon?
5. Give a list of the persons employed and the amounts paid to each.

The Minister of Public Works stated that he did not have the answer prepared. He would have it tomorrow.

Mr. W. Chester S. McLure asked the Minister of Public Works:—

- 1. Has a petition been received from Mr. Alexander D. McLean; Mr. Henry Taylor; Mr. Charles A. McDougall and other residents of Nine Mile Creek, Rice Point and Canoe Cove regarding a ferry service?
2. What action has been taken by the Government?
3. The Minister of Public Works stated that he could not find that any petition had been received from the residents of Nine Mile Creek, but he remembered that something had been brought up in this connection last year. Nothing had been done in the matter so far.

Mr. W. J. MacMillan asked the Premier the following questions:—

- 1. Has the Government been requested by the Prime Minister or Government of Canada to reimburse the settlers defrauded by Andrew Fraser Mitchell while acting as an agent of the Province under the Bell Government.
2. Does the Government of Canada undertake to bear part of the burden of paying these claims?
3. What is the intention of the Local Government in this regard.
4. Table any correspondence in reference to this matter.

The Premier replied that this was the first opportunity he had of seeing these questions; he did not have an answer ready at the moment.

Mr. W. Chester S. McLure asked the Leader of the Government:—

- 1. Give the names of all persons appointed as School Inspectors since last September, 1927.
2. Give the class of teachers' license held by each person so appointed.
3. Have any of the persons so appointed been since dismissed or have they resigned.
4. If so, give the name or names, state in such case whether dismissal or resignation and the cause or reason for such dismissal or resignation.

The Premier stated that he regretted having overlooked this matter; he would have an answer ready tomorrow.

Mr. Mustard asked leave of the House to present a motion of John H. McLean and C. ... praying for "An Act to Incorporate the Presbyterian Church at Montague."

An act embodying the petition was read a first time.

also an act to provide for a plebiscite relating to the suppression of the traffic in alcoholic liquors. On motion of the Premier "An Act to further amend an act to further amend the act to incorporate the Telephone Company of Prince Edward Island being 48 Victoria Cap 10" was read a second time, and the House went into committee of the whole to take it into consideration. The amendment provides, inter alia, that the Telephone Company shall, before January 15th, in every year, pay to the Government of Prince Edward Island a sum of money, equal to 11-2 per cent of its gross earnings from rentals and tolls collected during the previous year, but not less than \$2,000 per year. The bill was duly passed in committee and was ordered to be engrossed and read a third time tomorrow. An act respecting the Board of Commissioners of Public Utilities once more came up for consideration in committee of the whole. After discussion, the clause providing that a public utility might be entitled to earn annually an amount not less than eight per cent of the fair value of its property was stricken out. The bill was then passed in committee and ordered to be read a third time tomorrow. On motion of the Premier, the House adjourned at 6 p. m., to meet again today at 3 p. m.
