Upset Victories Feature Harness Racing Meet At Montague Yesterday

Over 2000 already thrill-soaked harness racing fans received a further soaking yesterday afternoon when the second meeting of the season staged at Montague track furnished them with spectacular driving finishes, but the royal over the entire length of the fast piece of racing dirt and the always present upset victories as the underdogs again came through to earn an even break in the battles of speed between the cream of the Island trotters and pacers.

In the galaxy of speed on display only one horse, Babe Britton, managed to acquire a new win record, as Col. D. A. MacKinney, back into an active role in the sport, took her out on the latter part of the second mile of the number two event to head the field to the wire in 2:12 2-5, equalling the fastest mile paced all afternoon, but in the other miles the winners had to go very close to their records to get their noses in front as they flashed by the judges' stand their second trip around.

Extra Heat Necessary

And in that same class, productive of some of the best racing of a great racing card, fans saw three horses come out for an extra heat before Kelly's Nightmare, a rank outsider in capturing the third mile, outtraded the other two heat winners, Valie Long and Babe Britton. That upset victory preceded Nellie Worthy's equally surprising victory in class number three, the Buell-driven mare heading a field of nine starters in all three heats.

Allan Mac in winning the first heat on the card showed words of trotting ability in coming through with an expected win, while Harold Cudmore's Prince Just Money (Semple) was a two heat winner, Valie Long and Babe Britton. That upset victory preceded Nellie Worthy's equally surprising victory in class number three, the Buell-driven mare heading a field of nine starters in all three heats.

The duel, more commonly known as the "meets" tournament, was inaugurated here last year by the local club as a means to bring together the week-end high-handicap golfers of the various clubs through the three provinces in a series of competitions, and to create a greater interest in golf generally.

In its inaugural year, the tournament went over with outstanding success and with the local club having everything fully arranged to give the visiting golfers a really bang-up time, it should meet with equally good results, if not even better than last year.

Commencing Monday, local tennis competition will also come into its own when the Charlottetown Tennis Club stage their annual Club championships. The tourney will be a week-long affair and is expected to produce some really excellent competition before the week is out. The courts are in excellent condition and the large number of members who have signified their intention of taking part, practically assures the tournament of being a highly successful event.

There will also be plenty of activity in both Junior and Senior League ball when the respective divisions will clash in regular scheduled tilts, while in the harness racing, the Wednesday afternoon and Saturday night racing programs will be coming up with their usual keen performances which have been highlighting local sporting entertainment since this season.

Sporting attractions which will be taking place off the Province, and in which local entries will be taking part, include the Maritime Track and Field Championships being held at Amherst, N.S., this Saturday. A strong Abegweit team will be the sole participants from the Province when they compete in the Maritime Trophy which they won last year. The Junior section of the squad will be leaving for Amherst on Friday in order to be ready to compete in events there in the morning while the senior squad, who will not compete until the afternoon will leave here Saturday morning.

With the Maritimes experiencing for the first time the thrill of holding the Dominion Tennis Championships within their own borders, which are progressing full swing at the present time at Halifax, many local enthusiasts are apparently not going to miss out on this golden opportunity of seeing Canada's best competing against one another in really outstanding tennis play, and judging from the general talk at the moment, many will be leaving for the Hub City over the week-end to witness the final clashes for Dominion titles.

In addition to the other golfing activities this week, it is understood that members of the Charlottetown Club will fly by special plane to New Glasgow, N.S., this Sunday where they will compete with the Mainland Club in a series of friendly matches. Although the complete arrangements have not been finalized, it is believed that some 15 or more players will make the trip for the inter-club competitions. It is also anticipated that the New Glasgow Club will return the visit the following Sunday in a similar series of competitions.

Halifax Tennis Games Yesterday Rained Out

HALIFAX, Aug. 3—(CP)—An uninvited guest—the weatherman—crashed the Canadian lawn tennis championships today and his antics fell as flat in some quarters as the wet-blanket generally associated with all intruders.

Overnight showers and intermittent downpours during the day turned Halifax's clay courts into soggy mush, forcing postponement of quarter-finals in four events—men's and women's singles and doubles.

There was disappointment among fans at the delay of meetings between W.J. (Bill) Tully, defending singles champion from Bronxville, N.Y., and Vancouver's Walter Stohberg; Halifax's Don Bauld and Lorne Mann, 19-year-old amateur star from Vancouver.

But tournament officials were not too downhearted for they revealed that the tournaments' progress actually was one full day ahead of schedule. They said that, given a break by the weatherman, the time lost today will not prolong the championships beyond Saturday.

When play resumes, little Henri Rochon of Montreal, Canada's top-ranking player, is scheduled to meet fellow-Montrealer Edgar Lanthier. The other quarter-final sends James Macken, also of Montreal, against the tournament dark-horse, E. Blair Hawley, the ex-United States G.I. from Cambridge, Mass.

Four Montrealers—defending champion Patricia Macken, Mrs. C. H. Mitchell, Sydney, N.S., and two stylish amateurs, Rhoda J. Hopkins, Woodhaven, N.Y., and Mrs. Baba Lewis, the 1948 winner from Jamaica Plain, Mass.

Most players took today's holiday from tennis in stride. Many took the opportunity to tour the sights of Halifax or attend indoor entertainments on the city's bicentenary celebration program.
