Hungary Wants Equality of Rights

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) BUDAPEST, March 26.—Hungary will petition the League of Nations for the equality of military rights for the equality of the face of position, Premier Julius Goemboes said here tonight in a political address. Germany asked for equality and when it was not granted, assumed it, he said, by virtue of her sovereignty; Hungary could not do this, but as a member of the League, he said, would submit her request to that body. "Let us hope that, aided by our Italian friends and all those who have shown themselves heretofore to be our friends, we will reach our goal," he said. "Hungary wishes also to emphasize in international relations her political and economic interests. We believe that if it is a question of solution of the whole group of questions, financial and economic matters should also be discussed."

NOVA SCOTIA ESTIMATES (C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) HALIFAX, March 26.—Premier Angus L. MacDonald told the Nova Scotia legislature today he hoped to bring down his estimates Thursday afternoon. He would move at the same time, he asserted, that the House go into committee of supply to consider them.

Dr. Bonnell's Call To Fifth, Ave N. Y.

In 1807 New York City had but one Presbyterian church, the First, in Wall Street. Its congregation quarrelled, among other things, over the new-fangled hymns of Isaac Watts. So the anti-Watts faction set up their own church in Cedar Street. Successively locating in Duane Street and lower 11th Avenue, the congregation in 1876 built a big, brownstone Gothic church which still stands at Fifth Avenue and 55th Street among clubs, hotels and big shops. Associated at one time or another with such old New York names as Anchinicos, Sloane, Leeds, Agnew, Grand, Vail and Aspinwall, the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian Church is famed for its sloping auditorium, its fine acoustics, its old gas brackets and reflectors. Incorporated in founding Princeton Theological Seminary, Presbyterian Hospital and many a mission church, this rich old house of God was once called the Cathedral of Presbyterianism.

Of Fifth Avenue's last two co-pastors, Dr. Henry Howard died in 1933 at 74 and Dr. Minot Canfield Morgan, 58, went that year to Greenwich (Conn.) First Presbyterian Church. To win back its prestige and fill once more its 2,000 seats, the Fifth Avenue Church knew it had to find pulsing new ministerial blood. Last week it thought it had done so when Dr. John Sutherland Bonnell, 40, of Winnipeg, Manitoba accepted the congregation's unanimous call. A wartime runner in the 5th Canadian Siege Battery, Dr. Bonnell has held pastorates in Prince Edward Island, St. John, N. B. and Winnipeg where during the past six years he received 1,000 into Westminster United Church, drew overflow audiences in two lecture halls adjoining his church. Last year Dr. Bonnell was the youngest man ever to receive a D.D. from his alma mater, Dalhousie University in Halifax. Two sermons at Fifth Avenue Church one Sunday last month was enough to earn Dr. Bonnell the call, which involves \$10,000 a year, a three-month vacation and "the equivalent of a manse"—his rent paid.—New York Times.

LEGISLATURE IN COMMITTEE YESTERDAY

Legislative Chamber, March 26.—The House met at 3.45 p.m. Hon. Mr. MacPhee introduced an Act to amend the Prohibitory Act. It was read a first time.

BILLS PASSED The following bills were read a third time and passed: An Act to empower the Maritime Trust Company to do business in Prince Edward Island (Mr. Stewart). An Act to incorporate the Charlottetown Trust Company (Mr. Stewart). An Act to amend the Electrical Inspection Act (Hon. Mr. MacPhee). An Act to amend the Gasoline Tax Act, 1923 (Premier MacMillan).

PUBLIC HEALTH MEASURES On motion of Premier MacMillan the House went into committee with Mr. J. A. MacDonald in the chair on an Act to amend the Public Health Act 1927. The amendment adds to Sec. 6 of the Act the following additional powers to the Provincial Board of Health: (30) The compulsory closing, repairing or demolition of dwellings houses unfit for habitation or otherwise any structure whose condition may be a health hazard or public nuisance or productive or inductive thereof. (31) The compulsory installation of sewerage by the owner in premises when the lack of same makes of the said premises unsanitary, injurious, obnoxious or the condition offensive to the adjoining citizens or the public generally. (32) To prevent the keeping of foxes and pigs within the City of Charlottetown.

GEORGETOWN INC. ACT On motion of Mr. J. H. MacDonald the House went into committee with Mr. Wignome in the chair on an Act to amend the Georgetown Incorporation Act. Sec. 1 repeals Sec. 6 of the Act prohibiting the Mayor and Councilors during their terms of office from entering into contracts of business nature with the town. Hon. Mr. Arsenault opposed the principle of the amendment and moved that Sec. 1 be deleted. Mr. J. A. MacDonald supported the motion, which was carried. Sec. 2 gives the following additional powers to the Town Council under Sec. 71 of the Act: (52) To compel the attendance at the public school of all children of school age. Also to regulate the presence of school children on the streets, lawns and in the public buildings of the town. (53) To regulate, inspect, assess and license fox ranches, now established or to be established within the town limits.

PHOTO PEDDLERS' LICENSE On motion of Hon. Mr. MacPhee the House went into committee with Mr. Stewart in the chair on an Act to prevent peddlers travelling and selling within the Island without license. The amendment provides that "no transient or itinerant persons shall carry on the business of a photographer, or canvass, solicit or peddle photographs, or pictures made from photographs, or offer such pictures or photographs as a premium with any other goods, or sell or offer for sale frames for such pictures in the Province of Prince Edward Island, without having first taken out a license therefor, the fee for such license to be \$100 and the fine for violation of this section to be a sum not exceeding \$200.

HUNGARIAN PARTRIDGE On motion of Hon. Mr. Sharp the House went into committee with Mr. Hunter in the chair on an Act to amend the Game Act 1928. The amendment allows for the shooting of Hungarian partridge for a 15 day period in 1935, the bag limit to be three birds. The legislation had been asked for by the Fish and Game Association, the promoter explained. It is generally understood that Hungarian partridge, since they were introduced here a few years ago, have spread over Queen's County and a part of Prince. It had been complained that they congregated in Charlottetown and other cities and were in some cases becoming a nuisance. Mr. Lea opposed the amendment and suggested that if the birds were becoming a nuisance in Queen's County they could be trapped and distributed east and west throughout the Province. Hon. Mr. Sharp said he had expressed the same opinion personally to the Fish and Game Association. Mr. Allen thought it would be a mistake to give any open season this year for Hungarian partridge. Mr. Cox agreed that an open season would be premature until '36. Mr. Lea said that the Hungarian partridge were useful birds on a farm and it would be a pity to shoot them. Messrs. LePage and Dennis concurred with the other speakers in opposing the bill. On motion of Hon. Mr. Sharp, progress was reported, the committee asking leave to sit again. INSURANCE ACT On motion of Hon. Mr. MacPhee the House went into committee with Mr. Wignome on an Act to amend the Insurance Act. The promoter explained that in 1933 the House had passed a lengthy Insurance Act, since the passing of this Act numerous conferences of Provincial Superintendents of Insurance have been held. The amendments now proposed are the recommendations adopted at those meetings. Similar legislation of the other provincial legislatures, and it was very desirable to obtain uniform insurance law throughout Canada. After brief discussion, and the adoption of some of the interpreting clauses, progress was reported. The House took recess until 9 p.m.

Strong Plea For Purse Seining

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) OTTAWA, March 26.—Purse seining for late-run sockeye and pink salmon was necessary if Canadian packers were to provide good quality packs of these varieties, W. A. Found, Deputy Minister of Fisheries, contended before the House Fisheries Committee. The committee was considering the bill of Thomas Reid (Lib. New Westminster) which would prohibit purse-sein fishing in the estuary of the Fraser River. Explaining it was necessary to get these varieties of salmon before they entered the fresh water because they deteriorated rapidly in the river, Mr. Found gave an extensive review of the situation on the Pacific Coast and contended that while the purse seining should interfere as little as possible with drift or gill net fishing it should not be eliminated altogether. In order to get all sides of the controversy the committee of which W. G. Ernst (Cons. Queen's) is chairman, adjourned to give the canners, the purse-sein and gill-net fishermen an opportunity to present briefs.

RED SHIRTS KILLED PESHAWAR, India—(C.P.)—Ghairat and Nuroz, two notorious "red shirt" outlaws were killed resisting arrest after they had killed one policeman and wounded another.

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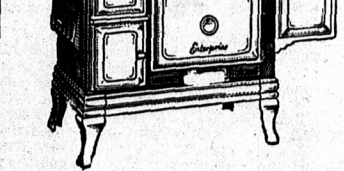
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
