#### LAUNCH ANTI NAZI CAMPAIGN

SAARBRÜCKEN, Saar Basin Territory, Dec. 27.—A violent pro-bleticle campaign against Hitlerism got under way today in the Saar as anti-Nazis charged Hitler's henchmen had staged a "pother" "blood purge" in Germany.  
"One hundred have been killed and 1,000 arrested in another June 30 directed against the SS (Schutz Staffeln, picked Nazi guards) and the Hitler youth," the anti-Nazi newspaper Volkstimme said.  
German officials obviously were alarmed by the sudden attacks, for both sides agreed that another such bloody house-cleaning in Germany as that of last June would prove the ace of trumps for parliamentarism with the French cause, or the League of Nations.  
The anti-Nazi faction asserted thousands who intended to vote for reunion with Germany at the plebiscite Jan. 13 have swung to sympathy with the French cause, or with continuance of League rule, since Adolf Hitler purged his forces six months ago.

#### Death And Destruction Left In Wake Of Gale

BOSTON, Dec. 27.—The fiercest gale in Boston's history scourged this city and left behind it death and widespread ruin.

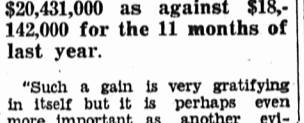
It sent three persons to their deaths; it reduced frame dwellings to splinters and it sent a variety of structures from tall towers toppling to destruction. Its piercing blasts fanned two destructive fires and sent the mercury in thermometers crashing downward until atop Mount Washington, New England's loftiest summit, it registered 30 degrees below zero.

#### Wintry Blast To Be Followed By Sub Zero Weather

Country Roads Blocked And Auto Travel Hazardous On Highways. Storm Is General Throughout Dominion.

In some sections of Canada the weatherman promised milder weather today but others faced longer sojourns in the sub-zero realm. Wintry blasts that whipped across the West, through the East and into the Maritimes during a post-Christmas rally carried a snow blanket that still covers the countryside, blocking country roads and making auto travel on the highways hazardous.

New Brunswick was lashed by bitter winds last night and temperatures tumbled. The wind struck Saint John at a 58-mile-an-hour clip, and the mercury slipped to six degrees. For today the forecasts indicated the Maritimes would have to get along with weather that would be "quite cold."

Snowflurries  
In Ontario, covered with snow that blew across the country on a day-after-Christmas storm, forecasts call for snowflurries in the north with the night bringing colder weather.

In Ottawa and Upper St. Lawrence areas snowflurries will appear but the weather will be milder. Snowflurries are indicated for parts of Quebec with little change in temperatures.

Frigid readings yesterday were topped by Dawson in the Yukon where it was 42 below. The mercury struck 26 below at Prince George, B. C., 23 below at Calgary and 36 at Battleford, Sask. It was 22 below at Winnipeg and Port Arthur and Kenora reported 20 below. In Quebec the mercury also slipped, Montreal recording 10 degrees under zero.

Transportation Hindered  
The Province yesterday was visited by an old-fashioned snowstorm, which increased in intensity during the afternoon but modified in the evening. City streets and sidewalks were steeply banked in several places. Motor car traffic which operated with difficulty in the morning, ceased altogether during the afternoon. Fortunately the storm was not serious enough to tie up car ferry and railway transportation, though the service operated behind schedule. The car ferry made the Borden afternoon trip in slightly over two hours, the mail train, with slow ahead, reaching Charlottetown at 9:45 p. m. No serious difficulty was reported on any section of the railway lines. Telephone and telegraph communication in the province was not interfered with. The mail plane did not make its regular flight owing to the storm.

Schooner Overdue  
HALIFAX, Dec. 27.—A bitter wintry wind whistled over Nova Scotia tonight, while snow which made traffic heavy throughout the day continued to fall.

The coastline was lashed by huge breakers and inland provinces reported the worst blizzard in many years.

Near Truro highways were piled high with snow and motor traffic was at a standstill although railways were able to maintain service, somewhat retarded. The town was cut off from its electrical supply for several hours when hydro lines failed.

#### 16 Killed, 43 Injured In Mine Track Wreck

POWELLTOWN, W. Va., Dec. 27.—Sixteen men were killed and 43 injured, four perhaps fatally, by the explosion today of a locomotive hauling a train in which 300 miners were riding to work.

The terrific blast occurred just as the morning sun peeped over the mountains into this little mining community.

It literally shook the isolated settlement and when the great barrage of escaping steam had cleared from the wreckage the dead and dying lay sprawled over an area of more than 100 yards.

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SAINT JOHN, N. B., Dec. 27.—Return of a tug sent to assist an unidentified schooner reported in difficulty outside of Saint John harbor was awaited here tonight.
