**MONTREAL, Feb. 8**—(CP)—Detroit Red Wings, playing their usual solid defensive game to back up their confident passing attack, skated to an almost routine 5-3 victory over the juckless Montreal Canadiens before 11,181 Forum fans here Saturday night to preserve their three-point margin over Toronto at the top of the National Hockey League standing.

Bill Duran, who had turned in some sensational saves from wing attackers while his teammates pressed for the equalizer in the final frame, was removed from the nets by coach Dick Irvin with only 15 seconds remaining. Abel got the draw on a faceoff in his own zone and let go with a hap-hazard shot that somehow found its way right into the unguarded Montreal cage.

**BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 8**—(AP)—Enrique Tirabocchi, Italian swimmer who won the English Channel in 1923, died today. Tirabocchi, long a resident of Argentina where he first arrived in 1913, was in the water 16 hours and 33 minutes on the Channel crossing. He had failed by two miles in 1922.

He retired in 1947 after serving as professor of physical culture at several Argentine athletic clubs.
