Winter Clothes Prominent in Paris Fashions

PARIS, Dec. 18 (Reuters) — With winter sports threatening to break all records this year in the Alps, skiing and skating clothes are finding a predominant place in Paris fashion displays.

While the French style setters wonder what sports wear visitors abroad will bring with them, designers will notice many changes in the French winter sports outfits.

It is obvious that France has accepted, as the smartest and most practical skiing trousers, the full length type which tapers into the wearer's boots. In jackets, popularity wavers between the full length shape and the short belted blouse or battledress variety.

Vivid greens, bright yellows, reds and blues predominate, with an alternative of black offset by some bright color. Borrowing the idea from Winston Churchill's wartime sliver suit, one well-known designer shows a steel grey battledress complete with zipper fastenings and flap pockets.

Fur promises to play an important role in ski wear this year, there are many waistcoats in inexpensive fur-lined woolsens materials or velvet in contrasting colors.

Wool-lined waistcoats have zipper fastenings with colorful wool tassels at the ends.

For skating, knitted woolen tights in bright red or bright green match sweaters generally knitted with white in the design. Brief circular skirts of corduroy or woolen material are shown with these suits.

For gala skating nights, there are "dressy" suits. One, in black, has a black skirt studded with gold nail-heads. Another is green and violet with a stylized heraldic design around the edges of the skirt and the suit.

Finally, for visiting there is the white goat skin hooded fox jacket, regulation pants and a snowy manish brocade vest.

Europe Seeks Trade With South Africa

CAPE TOWN, Dec. 17 (AP)—Considerable interest is being shown by European countries in the future of the Union and prospects of South Africa's immigration plans, trade with Europe and the establishment in the Union of European industries are promising.

S. F. Waterston, minister of economic development and mines, reviewing a recent visit to Europe.

"Wherever I went I met industrialists anxious to come out and start their particular industries here," he said. The minister added that South African immigration committees will find co-operative spirit among northern European governments. A number of young Dutch farmers are anxious to come to the Union and the Belgian government too was sympathetic to South Africa.

Both Sweden and Norway would buy South African wines, while Sweden also was a good market for fruit. Norway had bought wool and would buy wine and Denmark was satisfied with the quality and price of a large quantity of marmalade bought from South Africa. The

minister reported that France was buying wool and sending her own ships for it, while the Italian textile trade also was willing to buy South African wool. Italians also were ready to buy South African products like asbestos and chrome ore and if the Union could supply coal to Italy it would receive cement in return, Mr. Waterston said.

The South African government has been advised by High Commissioner Nicholls in London that 40,000 people in Britain are waiting to come to South Africa and all are willing to provide their own passage.

Senator C. F. Clarkson, minister of the interior, said that from statistics supplied him there would be no difficulty in absorbing all skilled and semi-skilled men. He said that shipping was the only bottleneck at present but that everything possible was being done to ease the situation.

"We must see to it that when these people arrive work and particularly accommodation are found for them," he said.

The United States Government has decided that when the loan-lead negotiations with South Africa are concluded a fairly large proportion of the credit obtained will be used to foster an interchange of cultural personnel between the two countries. This will include artists, musicians, university professors and students.
