**ANNUAL MEETING OF  
DINNIS PEDIGREED FOXES**

The adjourned annual meeting of the John R. Dinis Pedigreed Foxes, Ltd., held in the Board of Trade Rooms, Tuesday evening, was a very representative one.

The Directors' report was adopted, together with the business statement for the breeding season 1913-1914.

On account of the extension made to the Company's operations, it was resolved to enlarge the directing board. Last year's Directorate was re-elected en bloc, as follows:—Mr John R. Dinis, Charlottetown; Dr B. C. Borden, Sackville, N.B.; Major A. A. Bartlett, Charlottetown; Mr Charles Lyons, Charlottetown, and Mr W. E. Cameron, Charlottetown. The two new Directors are Major Chas. Leigh, Charlottetown, and Mr C. H. Black, Charlottetown.

The regular annual meeting of the Company was held in the Board of Trade Rooms on Oct. 13, 1914, and on account of the unfinished state of the business was adjourned, to meet again on Nov. 24th. An English brokerage firm held an option on \$80,000 of the Company's stock, and as this did not expire till Nov. 1st, 1914, a closing out of the year's business was prevented before that date. This firm is now negotiating for a second option.

The following is the Directors' report to the Shareholders of the John R. Dinis Pedigreed Foxes, Ltd., Ladies and Gentlemen,—

We beg to submit for your consideration the following detailed report of the year's business.

The Company commenced operations last autumn with eleven (11) pairs of silver foxes, all registered in the Prince Edward Island Silver Fox Breeders' Association. To-day there are in the breeding pens nineteen pairs of pedigreed silver foxes.

At a special meeting held March 25th, 1914, the Company resolved to extend its breeding operations by retaining the young foxes whelped during the 1914 season and issuing share capital to the public on this additional asset. Supplementary letters patent were obtained, authorising the Company to issue up to \$750,000 of capital stock. Thereupon the Directors put an issue of \$200,000 on the market, and the President and Secretary were authorised to proceed with the disposal of it, twenty (20) per cent of the par value of the shares being set aside for agents' commissions, advertising and expenses of sale.

Had all this issue been taken up the Company would have paid over sixty (60) per cent in dividends to the shareholders. During the early summer months your Directors had every reason to believe that this issue would be quickly disposed of. The depressing trade conditions which followed the declaration of the European war affected the industry very adversely and caused quite a falling off in the sale of stock.

Up to Nov. 21st, 1914, two hundred and seventy-nine (279) shares (par value \$100) have been subscribed and fully paid up. Partial payments have been received on fifty-six (56) additional shares.

The Directors have sufficient money on hand after deducting the expenses of the current year, to warrant them paying a dividend of eight (8) per cent, and expect to be able to declare an additional cash dividend by the end of the year. This will depend on the contingency of the unpaid balances on shares already subscribed being paid up, or additional shares being subscribed.

The Directors propose to allot to the old shareholders whatever shares remain unsubscribed and fully paid up by Dec. 31, 1914. This is subject to conditions and resolutions which may be embodied in the minutes of the annual meeting.

To facilitate the distribution of this stock, the Directors pursuant to a resolution carried at the regular annual meeting on October 13th, have applied for supplementary letters patent authorising the division of the one hundred dollar shares into ten shares of ten dollars each.

The financial statement will be submitted by the Secretary-Treasurer for your consideration and approval. Respectfully submitted in behalf of the Directors,

**SAINTS' ARE CHAMPIONS  
OF FOOTBALL SERIES**

The very successful football record of St Dunstan's College was raised another notch yesterday afternoon when the senior team from that institution defeated the Connaughts in the final game of the series, thereby winning the championship.

The game was played on a dirty field, too muddy for much fast work; despite this, however, the game was not at all dull, and at periods some very brilliant flashes of play took place.

The St Dunstan's kicked off in the first half. This half might be called the Connaught half, as the boys of the red and white were compelled to range as often as four times. The Conns repeatedly got the ball down to their opponents line, but seemed unable to get the ball over. The scrum of the Conns was not working well, whereas the Saints scrum worked like a machine. The Conns continued to rush their opponents, meeting reverses which would demoralise their play for a time, but as the whistle blew for halftime, however, they had just sent the ball from their end for one of the prettiest plays of the game, executed by Harold Gillis.

The superior practice and training of the College boys was clearly evident in the second half, although the Conns were by no means a spent force, showing wonderful endurance with the little training they have had.

Although the Conns improved in the scrum somewhat in this half, the Saints opened out their play better and kept their opponents principally on the defensive.

It took the Saints fully twenty minutes hard play to overcome the stubborn resistance of the Conns and touch down the ball. The Saints dribbled to the Conns end and in the ensuing play Curran got the ball and went over the line, amid the thunderous applause of the hasty College rooters. Curran further excelled himself by converting with one of the nicest kicks seen for some time, sending the ball over the bar between the posts from a difficult position at right angles.

The Conns tried hard to even up matters, but were unsuccessful, and the game ended five minutes later with the Saints the victors by the score of 5-0 and also the champions of the series.

Mr James McMillan refereed, it is needless to say, satisfactorily.

A game between the Abegweits and St Dunstan's would now be interesting.

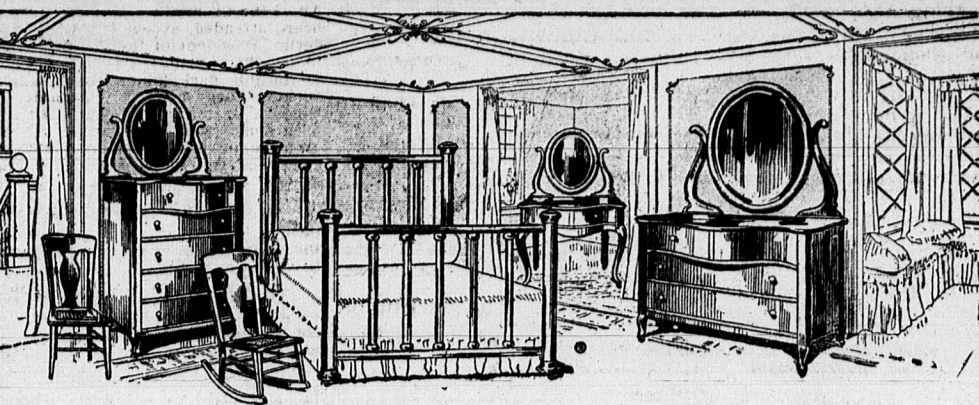

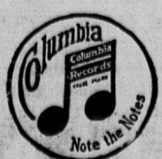
