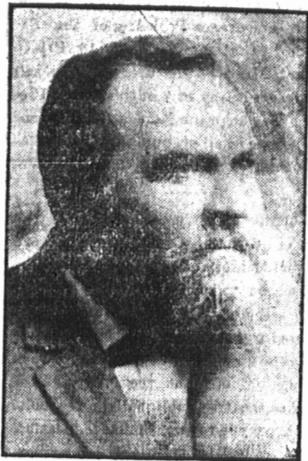
EUCLID NOT REQUIRED.
