Thousands of people representing many different attitudes toward and approaches to the same religious truth.

Unity and Harmony. In the midst of diversity one was reminded of a great orchestra in which the different elements blended into a rich strong and splendid harmony—each and all to the great leader.

Individuality. The great Baptist body is conscious of a distinctive message and believes that its large contribution can be made to the Kingdom by maintaining and expressing its life-preserving and splendid traditions and emphasizing those principles that are the contribution of this great church.

Vitality—this great body despite its centuries of age possesses the vital quality of youth—physical growth, intellectual response—the passion for great new adventure for the Kingdom—and the forward look.

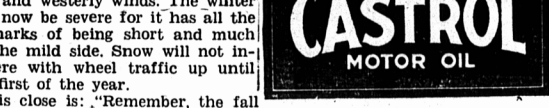

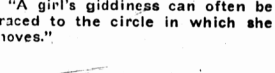
