Mr. Cullen made an appropriate reply thanking the donors for their gift in encouraging words. The presentation took place at the Waterford Hotel, the address being read by Magistrate J. L. McKinnon. Speeches appropriate to the occasion were made by Neil R. McArthur of Glace Bay, J. J. Gillis, M. Smith of the Bank of Nova Scotia, and others. Mr. Cullen was greatly admired by the business people of Waterford and his departure is much regretted. Mr. Cullen has many friends in Charlottetown.

The S. S. Cape Breton, after discharging her present cargo of coal for Buntain, Bell & Co., Charlottetown, will load a full cargo of oats, potatoes and vegetables for St. John's, Newfoundland, direct. This steamer has been entirely in the coal trade during the past season and her work for the balance of the season had been mapped out for her but, at the request of her agents here, and shippers, the general traffic manager of the Dominion Coal Co., Ltd., advised Buntain, Bell & Co. last evening that, rather than see provincial shippers suffer loss, they would agree to load the steamship with full cargo outward for St. John's, Newfoundland direct. The shippers here feel very grateful to the Dominion Coal Co. for granting them this privilege knowing that this steamer has been withdrawn from other trade which will seriously disarrange other business. The Cape Breton will in all probability have her coal cargo discharged by Thursday night and should be ready for cargo on Friday next. As she will carry in the vicinity of 30,000 bags it is urgent that her outward cargo be ready for her. Shippers are requested to arrange for this. The S. S. Cape Breton will be followed by the S. S. Norwenna, which comes here from St. John's direct to load a full cargo, and by the S. S. Cascoos and City of Sydney from Montreal to load part cargo, Buntain, Bell & Co. are the agents.

CEMETERY TRAGEDY RECALLED.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—The first of many suits arising out of an accident on May 18 last, when a large number of persons fell into an open grave at Greenwood Cemetery, was determined this morning, when Anthony O. Tucci, secured \$300 damages for the loss of a diamond ring. The case was filed in the First District Municipal Court, Judge Farrar presiding. Tucci, a prominent member of Roma Lodge, and a court interpreter in the United States District Court in Brooklyn, was badly bruised, but after a time he recovered from his injuries. He had, however, lost a \$300 diamond ring, which was pulled out of his finger as he was being dragged out of the grave. Through his attorneys, Moore, Williams & Urson, he began an action to recover for its value. It is understood that nearly two dozen lawsuits have grown out of the injury, and that at least a dozen of them are now on the calendar awaiting trial. Although all the other actions are for broken bones or other personal injuries, this was looked upon as the test case.

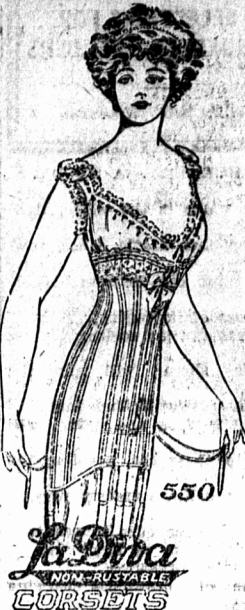

It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when they want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News phone No. 133, or for the Advertising phone No. 132.3, instead of 132; or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or for the News Phone No. 133, instead of 132-3; or when they want the News or Editorial Department ask Central for the Subscription phone No. 132-2, or the Advertising phone No. 132-3, instead of 133, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one of the above departments to find out what number to ask for to get another department. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions of news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, upstairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 6.30 p. m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone number except 133. Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want will greatly lessen the work of the Central telephone and the Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter and happier. 3-16dt.

KILLS GIRL WHO REFUSED HIM

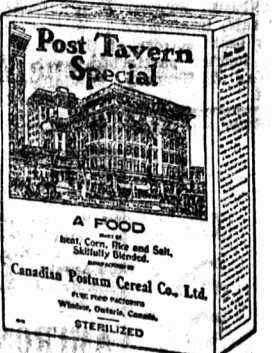
