Convocation Day At Prince Of Wales College

Sixteen Students Graduate From Institution this Year. Addresses By Principal Robertson, Premier Lea, Dr. Coffin, And Supt. of Education. High Honour Diploma Awarded. Valedictory Read By E. Benj. Rogers.

At the seventeenth annual Convocation of Prince of Wales College held yesterday morning at 9.30, at which His Honour Lieut.-Governor Heartz presided, medals and prizes were presented to the leading students eligible for such; diplomas were presented to the members of the graduating class, and certificates to the students on the honour list of the first and second years; addresses were delivered by Doctor S. N. Robertson, who, as principal, reviewed the year's work, by Premier Lea, by Doctor Coffin, and by Mr. H. H. Shaw, Chief Superintendent of Education.

The valedictory was read by Mr. Benjamin Rogers, member of the graduating class, and contained fitting reference to the passing of another group into the struggle of life.

START DRIVE AGAINST MARITIMERS

New England Immigration Officials Begin Campaign.

BOSTON, Mass., May 30.—Deported from the United States despite eight years residence in Boston, Kathleen Rose Gibson returned from Fredericton, N. B., yesterday after one of the most unusual compromises ever effected with the federal immigration department at Washington.

Colonel Percy A. Guthrie, of Boston, interested himself in the case, and gained the attention of the senator from Maine and the Boston congressman John Douglas, and George Holden Tinkham, both of Boston, interceded for her.

Miss Gibson said she returned to her home in 1927 for a vacation and came back to the United States unaware that under the 1924 immigration laws she must pay a head tax.

IN INDIA

Robinson, Superintendent of the Naval Academy, who said concessions to Japan under the Treaty amounted to a partial surrender of U. S. sovereignty over the Philippines.

Throne Speech Refers To Conference To Consider Methods Of Cooperation In Furthering Continuous Employment Throughout Canada During Winter Months.

BAD ACCIDENT AT SUMMERSIDE

OTTAWA, Ont., May 30.—In the Speech From the Throne delivered tonight in the Senate Chamber, His Excellency the Governor General announced his intention of causing Parliament to be dissolved immediately following prorogation.

The Speech announced that a Federal provincial conference for the purpose of furthering cooperation between the Dominion Government and the Governments of the several provinces on matters pertaining to immigration has been arranged.
