Representatives Of Big Four Teams To Decide Referee Question Tuesday

(Canadian Press)
AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 30.—Whether teams in the Maritime Hockey League will continue to permit a lone referee to preside at League games, will be decided at a meeting of league representatives Tuesday afternoon.

Originally, representatives of the four league teams agreed to operate with one referee in the first half of the opening round of the schedule but complaints and disagreements have been so numerous it was decided by President James A. Hanway, K. O., to call a meeting of league members who will decide future plans. Most disagreements arose from allegations that the referee could not handle the game alone with the innovation of the forward pass, as well as mark penalties.

The one referee plan, formulated to reduce expenses, possibly will be succeeded by the old system of the President naming two neutral referees and the home club selecting another official satisfactory to the visitors.

In announcing the meeting the President requested suggestions from league members for plans on Dec. 4 when Saint John will play at Halifax and Charlottetown at Moncton. If members prefer two referees the President said he would nominate outside men to control the respective games.

Len Harvey Captures Heavy Title

LONDON, Nov. 30.—(C. P. Cable)—Len Harvey captured the British heavyweight boxing championship tonight, outpointing titleholder, Jack Peterson of Cardiff, in a 15 round match fought before a capacity crowd in Albert Hall.

Harvey, who weighed only 168 pounds, started a short ender in the betting at two to one, but rocked the champion time and again and piled up a heavy margin on points in the closing rounds. Peterson scaled 175 pounds.

Harvey formerly held the British middleweight title.

The new British heavyweight king is not unknown in North America. He invaded the New York rings late in 1931 and although he dropped decisions in all three of his fights, his willingness to mix and hitting power gained him a good following.

He lost two close decisions in 12 round bouts to Vince Dundee, the hard-hitting Pennsylvania veteran, and lost to Ben Juby of New York in another match at the same distance. Then he returned to England, considerably richer for his trip.

Shipping Will Be Continued In Canals
MONTREAL, Nov. 30.—(C.P.)—Moderation in the weather has resulted in the Department of Railways and Canals ordering the operation for another two or three days the lock system of the Soulanges and Lachine Canal.

An order had been issued that all navigation in this section of the St. Lawrence Canal system would close at 11:59 tonight but the severe cold spell did not continue.

The canals will only remain open, however, to clear vessels already in them, of which there are still 18 downbound and three upbound. No vessels will be permitted to enter the Soulanges Canal from the west or the Lachine Canal from the east.

Freighters At Quebec

QUEBEC, Nov. 30.—Twelve large freighters were anchored at Wolfe's Cove tonight following departure today of the last Canadian Pacific liner. Tomorrow 10 of those ships will join in a convoy which the Government ice-breakers Mikula and N. B. McLean will escort to open water through the floating ice-fields which had impeded navigation in the St. Lawrence for more than two weeks.

The laws vary from those providing "wide open" saloons in Nevada to a strict system of dispensing hard liquor in Montana only through state-owned stores, one in every county.

In a half a dozen states, the status of liquor after repeal depends on the action of state legislatures in the next four days.

Most widely enacted of the laws is one providing for serving of hard liquor only with meals. In Chicago, on the other hand, the only regulation is that the drinker must be seated as he or she imbibes.

Then, there is Massachusetts' proposed law, which would allow "men only" to drink in taverns. Under the proposal, dancing would be allowed in the taverns, but women would not be admitted.

Schoolboy Athletes Receive Invitation For Trip To Australia

(Canadian Press)
TORONTO, Nov. 30.—Australia moved today to give Canada its first All-Canadian schoolboy track and field championship meet by inviting a team of 12 school track stars to visit the 1934 centenary celebration of the founding of Melbourne and the State of Victoria.

The Dominion on the other side of the world will pay the team's expenses from the time it assembles at Vancouver.

In announcing the invitation, L. R. Macgregor, Australian Trade Commissioner, revealed Melbourne intends to stage a British Empire track meet for boys. In addition to the Canadians, teams from New Zealand, Great Britain, South Africa and India will be taken to the city to compete with Australian schoolboys.

Mr. Macgregor said he would do everything in his power to assist in the selection of the Canadian team. National trials will be staged at the Canadian Schoolboy Track and Field Championships on June 16, 1934, at Hamilton. In other years the Dominion meet has had few entries outside Ontario. The Australian invitation is likely to result in bringing boys from the far West, the Prairies and the Maritimes for a shot at "dream-trip" to Melbourne.

The Empire Games to be held about Oct. 14 are of the features of the centenary celebration.

The schoolboy trackmen will compete at 100 yards, 200 yards, 400 yards, half mile, one mile, 440 yards relay, mile relay, 120 yards high hurdles, running high jump and running broad jump.

The team would spend a month in Australia. Two weeks in training and competition and the other two weeks in sightseeing.

Mr. Macgregor said he was confident the various provincial governments would be interested in the invitation and that Governments and sportsmen would see to it that every young athlete in the country with a chance to make the team would be present at the Hamilton trials.

TOUR OF ENGLAND AND SCOTLAND

A most interesting verbal description of his tour of England and Scotland was given by Mr. John Gordon, Jr., at a meeting of the B.Y.P.U. in the Baptist Church last evening. The lecture was rich in descriptive matter, was interspersed with humor and was greatly enjoyed by the audience.

In the beginning Mr. Gordon referred to his crossing on the "Westerland," and related his impressions of Southampton and the Isle of Wight. The vivid greenness of the Isle was striking.

Mr. Gordon then described in graphic language the various parts of England he visited, dwelling for some time on each of the towns through which he passed. The Devon countryside had the red soil peculiar to Prince Edward Island, a section of rolling hills, wonderful farms, square towered churches, great trees, picturesque villages with thatched cottages, winding narrow hedge-lined roads.

Among the numerous places visited were Oxford and Cambridge, the university centres. While in the former, he visited Wadham and Magdalen Colleges, and the Bodleian, which contains the manuscripts of Caedmon's song, the Anglo-Saxon Chronicle, and the Testament brought to England by Augustine.

At Cambridge they took a canoe and paddled several times up and down the length of the river, under the old bridge, and past the rows of huge trees lining the bank here and there. The view of the college buildings set back a little from the river is unequalled.

Centres of historic interest in London were not slighted during eleven days' stay in the great city. The speaker then described his trip north to the "Lake District," the scenery of which was very wonderful, with towering mountains rising steeply from the still lakes, and winding roads at the water's edge. Mr. Gordon then related experiences in Edinburgh, where he saw the Scott Memorial, the Edinburgh Castle on the Rock, the War Memorial Shrine, the work on which was as near perfect as the handwork of man could be. St. Giles Church, and the house and grave of John Knox.

Rankine Is Winner Of Marathon

BERWICK, Pa., Nov. 30.—With a long, unrelenting stride up hill and down dale, Robert Rankine, of Preston, Ont., won the 24th annual Berwick marathon today after a classic duel with Lou Gregory of New York, who finished second.

The Canadian staged a courageous sprint in the last half-mile of the mountainous nine-mile course to win by 60 feet.

Rankine's display of determination and his reserve energy in the pinch kept the historic title in Canada. Wilf McCluskey, Toronto's veteran star who won the race last Thanksgiving Day, finished seventh in today's field of 35.

Almost from the starter's gun Rankine and Gregory hooked up in the duel that made the race a thriller. Mile after mile they stayed almost abreast. But a half mile from the finish line, with the roadside spectators shouting for an American victory, the Preston marathoner put on a sprint Gregory could not match.

Rankine's time of 48 minutes, 30 seconds, was creditable considering the wind that blew head-on down a great part of the course. Gregory's time was 48:44. For Monday of New York, was third in 49:17 and Johnny Kelley, Arlington, Mass., fourth in 49:37.
