Hagenlacher's Game Will be hard to Beat, Says Referee

NEW YORK, April 5.—Eric Hagenlacher, of Germany, has reached the peak of the professional 18.2 bailliard billiard realm with a careful, methodical game which will not be readily surpassed by American sports of brilliance, in the estimation of the veteran referee, Charles Peterson, of St. Louis.

A placid disposition not easily ruffled by unexpected "breaks" at crucial periods of his matches adds to the smoothness of his play an essential factor for retention of the championship, said Peterson, who has officiated in 288 matches without dispute, including the last in the contest in which Jack Schaefer was dethroned by the German star.

"Schaefer and Edouard Horemans, of Belgium, unquestionably are the most brilliant and spectacular players in the game," is Peterson's opinion. "But both are temperamental, and their remarkable long runs may be suddenly counteracted by slumps under unfavorable conditions."

**"Babe" Ruth Can Make or Break New York Yankees**

"Bill" McGeehan, writing in The New York Herald-Tribune, says: Col. Jacob Ruppert, owner of the New York Yankees, on his return from an inspection of his athlete and his Florida realty investment, is optimistic about both. The owner of a big league baseball club has to be an optimist these days with ivory both expensive and brittle. The colonel owns the most expensive and the most erratic of the same being Mr. Babe Ruth.

While the Babe has been a problem and an irritation to his owners and to Mr. Miller Huggins, he also has been the greatest drawing card in baseball. If the Yankees had not acquired him, there never would have been any necessity for the Yankee stadium, the largest in baseball. The question is: "Will the Babe continue to keep the stadium reasonably filled?"

All of the early indications are that he will. In the various towns touched by the barnstorming trip of the Yankees north there seems to be the same joy among the customers when the Babe comes to bat, even when he strikes out. The Babe remains colorful figure. He can strike out with more vim and vehemence than any baseball player in either league. Few baseball players can cause even a mild sensation other than one of derision when they are striking out.

At St. Petersburg, the Babe was full of good resolutions and not too much food. Every time he went into the dining room there came to him memories of the stomach ache he acquired while pullingmaning north last year, a stomach ache that was felt under no world, this spring he went after no gastronomic records. He ate sparingly for an athlete of his proportions.

The Babe was particularly slim of figure. This year he reported with an equator greatly reduced over the expanse it showed last year. The reduction was attained at the Babe's expense and by somewhat strenuous exercise for an athlete in the national pastime, in which the physical strain is comparatively mild. There was no preliminary boiling out session at Hot Springs, Ark., at the expense of his club. Instead, the Babe paid for his own preliminary training, and when he saw the bill for the same, he burst into a profuse perspiration that left him slimmer than he ever had been at that time of the year.

Of course, there are those who are quick to predict that the star of the Babe is on the wane. There is nothing so musical to the ear of some of these as the crashing of a popular idol. They have been waiting for years for the passing of Speaker Coby and Johnson and predict it every spring. Naturally the passing of the Babe would be a joyous occasion for them, as the Babe has been the most colorful figure in baseball, if not the most colorful of all the American athletes of modern times.

**STOCK MARKET**

MONTREAL, April 5.—Dominion live stock report, cattle receipts 428. There was a light offering of cattle but sufficient to meet the limited holiday demand, prices were steady to possibly a shade better in spots. One load of good steers averaging 1,130 pounds were sold for \$7.75 and two or three loads of fairly good quality north west steers sold for \$7.00 and \$7.30. Common light steers, fair heifers and a few young cows were weighed up together at \$5.50. There were very few common cows or bulls weighed up. Quotations on these were about steady. 

**Olympic Games for Women Only in Sweden This Year.**

GOTHENBURG, April 5.—Olympic Games for women only to which all nations will be invited to send two competitors for each event have now been definitely arranged for August 27-29 in Gothenburg this year.

They will mark the second international contest of the kind, held under the auspices of "La Federation Sportive Feminine Internationale" and since this body also plans to cooperate with the International Olympic Committee in future games, the official title of the meet in Sweden this summer will be "The Second International Athletic Games for Women."
