The apartment is expected to be ready for occupation in about ten days time.

The fancy dress ball given at Shaws Hotel, Brackley Beach, August 10th, will long be remembered by the many guests stopping at that charming Hotel as being one of the most brilliant as well as unique balls ever given in the Hotel. Some of the costumes worn have been brought by guests who have travelled round the world, naturally making it most interesting. Later on in the evening the prizes were presented for the Tennis Tournament by C. C. Kirkpatrick of Ottawa. Jack Irwin of Toronto lost to Robert and Mrs. Shaw, provided a delicious and tempting supper to the guests, about 60 of the many stopping at the Hotel, were in costume.

Professor Kirkpatrick, the civil engineer in charge of the survey for the harbor at Carleton Point, says the breakwater will be constructed of creosoted piles and rip-rap on the bar which runs south from the Point a distance of 800 yards. From its outer end to Amherst Point there will be an opening of about 600 yards wide which will afford an entrance to the basin thus formed in which it is intended to construct the dock. The latter will also be built of creosoted piles from the top of which the platform connecting the trains with the steamer will be operated by hydraulic power. On the Tormentine side it is intended to construct the dock beside the pier already built there.

Charlottetown Rebekahs will be interested in the following summary of a report of the past year's work read recently at the Rebekah Assembly at Yarmouth:—During the year eight new subordinate and one Rebekah lodge have been instituted and one Rebekah, viz., Maple Leaf, No. 13, Summerside, has been reconstituted. The gain in membership for the year, exclusive of the new lodges, has been 322, and adding the membership of the new lodges gives a total net gain of 542. These figures are exclusive of Aroostock lodge No. 199, and King No. 125, from which no reports have been received, the latter being only instituted on June 12th last. In 1908 there were 92 lodges with a membership of 8,620, today there are 115 lodges on the roll with a membership of 10,488, an increase in four years in both lodges and membership of almost 25 per cent.

TYPOGRAPHICAL CONVENTION.

(Canadian Press.)

CLEVELAND, OHIO, Aug. 16—A bold but unsuccessful attack was made by "Progressives" in the International Typographical Unions convention today upon the alleged autocracy of the Administration.

President James M. Lynch himself took the floor in opposition to progressives.

A proposal was made to appoint a board of 18 directors who would be given much of the power now wielded by the president and executive council of three.

Turning over to vice president George A. Tracy, Lynch in a fiery speech condemned the entire administrationists as theorists with quack remedies for imagined ills of organization. He declared that every so called progressive measure that has yet been offered would if adopted mean \$50,000 or \$60,000 a year greater expense.
