Should Doctors be Asked To Prescribe Alcohol By Government?

perance. I find today a condition of affairs that didn't exist under the old ones, too—in some cases respected church members— are making and drinking "moonshine" which seems to be a pretty good brand of grain alcohol...

not be obtained in certain cases. Another: "In the light of my therapeutic knowledge from text books and from professional teaching of the aperties in McGill, also from practical knowledge, total prohibition is not to be considered. I leave total prohibition to the penny-a-liner magazine writer or prohibition fadists and cranks."

I think that these remarks prove that doctors have very pronounced convictions on the alcohol question, and also that they are quite different from what you would conclude from the records of the number of certificates they write. It also may be a surprise to many to know that such a large percentage of doctors do not set a very high value on alcohol as a medicine in fact, say they can get along without it.

Personally I am convinced that many more would take the same stand if they took the time and the trouble to actually study the action of alcohol on the human system. We are apt to think that all was known about alcohol when we were in college that is known today, and it is such an unpopular subject that we don't even read the articles that may appear in the Medical Journals from time to time.

"The absence of any authoritative work is perhaps partly accounted for by the fact that many of the essential data are not known even to science. The usual explanation given to account for this position is that the subject is both intricate and ungrateful."

"We felt it therefore incumbent upon us to enter upon the task, however invidious it might be. It is a curious fact, but nevertheless true, that a doctor can take an active interest in child self-restraint or in the campaign of education regarding cancer, and he is commended for doing so, and rightly so, but let him take an active part regarding intemperance which causes more deaths and more suffering than cancer and the neglect of children combined, and he thereby is deemed a crank and a faddist."

I believe in total prohibition rather than in a form of liquor control as they have in Quebec and British Columbia, or the Gobleburg system, as advocated by one of the doctors which I have quoted. It is not impracticable or impossible. Total prohibition is the law in several states of the Union, and there are no more complaints about it than there are to the Volstead Act in force in the other States. The general public may not be ready for it, but that is only because they do not know the facts about alcohol."

I have dealt with this question from the standpoint of the scientist and did not mention anything on the moral and social side of the case. Perhaps I may be permitted to refer, in closing, to the Easter Message written by the editor of the Ladies' Home Journal which appears in the last number. It is entitled: "Woman, Why Weep—Thou'rt the woman is made to give several answers in the way of complaints. One is: 'Because my husband is a drunkard who neglects his home and his children; wasting his means and ruining his health and mind.'"

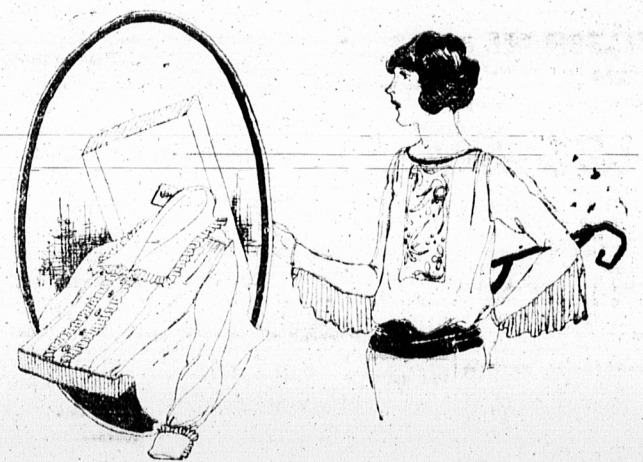
