THE TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

The GUARDIAN has had a good deal to say during the past three or four years in regard to our inadequate telegraph service. This has so far produced no apparent results beyond drawing the attention of the Federal Government and of the people themselves to our unfortunate disabilities.

The Charlottetown Board of Trade has spoken out strongly on the subject and the Maritime Board of Trade has also strongly endorsed our claim to reduced rates and night service, but still nothing has been done by the Anglo-American Company toward improving the service.

Now our merchants and business men, representative public and professional men, are speaking through these columns with wonderful unanimity in regard to our telegraphic needs. They with one voice demand a service that will place our people on a par with other provinces.

What this means will appear by the general statement that in telegraphing from the Island to points on the mainland Island people now pay twice as much for a private message of, say, ten words as is paid for a like message the same distance between two points on the Mainland. Why should not a message from Charlottetown to St John be carried as cheaply as from Halifax to St. John? Then in regard to press messages the St John and Halifax dailies receive the Associated Press reports, including their war news and cable news from Europe, for a mere fraction of what the Charlottetown dailies pay. The readers of all the newspapers would be the gainers if the papers could receive a thousand words for the same tolls they now pay for one hundred words.

To place the Island on equal terms with other Provinces means also that our telegraph system shall be open to receive and send messages during the evening and night with a cheaper rate by night, than by day for all other than press despatches. That the business community greatly feels the need of an evening service is made clear by the statements of our leading citizens already published and of others in various parts of the Island which will hereafter appear.

We must confess our surprise that any Island newspaper should appear to be willing that this Province shall be shut off from telegraph communication after seven o'clock in the evening while other Provinces enjoy a continuous service.

Governor Roosevelt appears to have distinctly lost ground with the better class of the electorate in New York state by tolerating the recent prize fight. An influential journal states that he is almost the only Governor in the United States who would have permitted such a transaction, and adds, "It is a stigma upon the State of New York that this

brutal contest could not only be held there, but that it could be without her Governor taking the slightest step for its prevention."

Dr. Cockburn, Agent General for South Australia is in Ottawa, and has expressed the opinion that not only will the scheme of federation be speedily carried through, but that the Commonwealth when formed will adopt the Canadian system of preferential trade with the Mother Country.

The Boston Herald learns from Washington that the agreement between Britain and Germany with regard to the Samoan Islands quite meets the views and wishes of the State Department. As Lord Salisbury says, the agreement is remarkable in giving what they want to each of the three powers concerned. Britain appears to have obtained an excellent exchange, with increased territorial possessions, while making a friendly settlement of the difficult and sometimes irritating Samoan question.

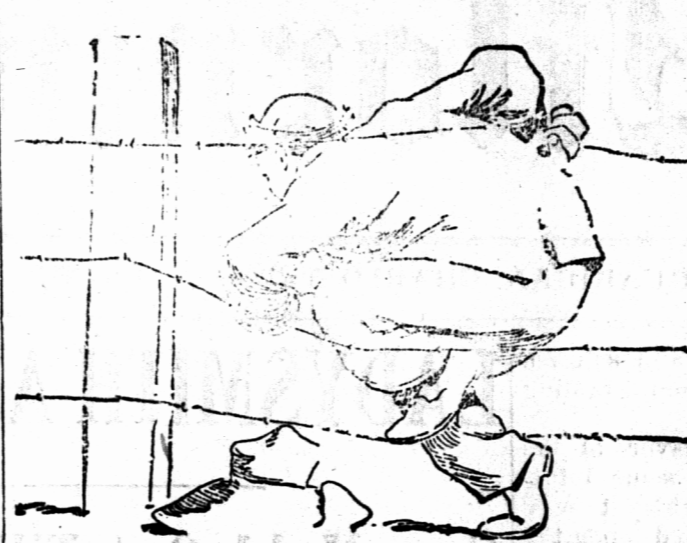
There is a little uncertainty as to the time intended in our despatch for Gen. Methuen to reach Colenso and Ladysmith. The doubt is as to whether he is expected to reach Ladysmith on Thursday of this week or Thursday of next week. It seems more probable that Thursday 23rd instant is meant, though that seems a painfully long time in the future in view of the serious position in the besieged town. Still it takes a long time to move an army division, with artillery and supplies across such a distance on a narrow gauge railway.

The arrival of the S. S. Sardinian on the 13th instant at St. Vincent, in the Cape Verde Islands is noted in the despatches. This makes it clear that our boys of the South African Contingent have gone by the Atlantic route and not by way of the Mediterranean. Being two weeks in reaching Cape Verde they would at the same rate of sailing be something longer than that time in covering the remaining distance to Cape Town. Much will, of course, depend upon the weather. The time to St Vincent has been rather slow.

"Keep up the agitation about street numbers" said a dry goods merchant to THE GUARDIAN Saturday. He had in mind the greater convenience of delivering parcels to his customers. The customers in their turn would soon find the advantage of receiving their parcels with more promptness and certainty. With numbered residences a citizen would be able to tell another precisely where he lives, instead of saying he lives somewhere on a street half a mile in length. The pastor visiting his parishoners, the doctor visiting his patients, the butcher, baker, grocers, milkman, in fact all our citizens and half the people of the surrounding country would find street numbers a great convenience.
