

# Record Crowds At Yesterday's Races

## Surprise Wins Feature Second Day Of Meet

The largest attendance since the Exhibition opened in 1889 was the statement made by the President of the Association yesterday afternoon in thanking the big audience for their support. It was a beautiful afternoon following a rather cloudy morning. The racing was exceptionally good with some finishes so close that the judges only could pick the winners.

With the exception of a slow start due to the tardy horsemen getting their entries out, the races and vaudeville moved along in good style with the entire program concluding at 5:30 with the super-sensational Great Milos, high aerial act.

There were two accidents that caused a lot of excitement, the first when the pacer Moonglow swerved in the first heat of the 2:16 unseating his driver, running away and crashing into a tree; the second when, at the finish of the 2:17 Trot, Scotty Watson, last horse in the third heat, struck a young boy who jumped over the fence on to the track.

Highlights of the racing were: the surprise win of Emily Grattan over the favorite Bonny Budlong in the 2:22 Pace; the defeat of Hillside Scot by Scotty Watson in the 2:17 Trot; and the win of the very much over-looked Oliver Grattan in the 2:16 Trot and Pace.

### 2:17 Pace, second division Purse \$350

In the first heat the horses were called at 1:45 and all but two of them were ready for the word at two o'clock but it was 2:12 before the heat was actually underway and several scores were spoiled trying to get the recent import, Jacob Withrow, away with the others. On the eighth score they got away to a good start with Bonny Budlong on the pole in the win. Despite a good drive by Johnny Conroy with Emily Grattan, Benny held to the first to the finish. Emily Grattan quit at her nose; Fred Worthing, who had been third horse entering the stretch, was beaten out in the dash to the wire by Sam, Nita Volo and Manchester Alberta in the order named. Jacob Withrow seventh, Time 2:18.

The second heat there was a different story. The finish when Emily Grattan out-footed Bonny Budlong from the head of the stretch to the wire finishing half a neck to the good; Fred Worthing, Prof. Rockford's pacer, went one of the best races of his career being a close third; Nita Volo fourth, Singin' Sam fifth, Manchester Alberta sixth, Time 2:16 1/2, a reduction of one-quarter of a second in Emily Grattan's record.

The third heat, Bonny Budlong took the lead after the first turn and held it until the last quarter when Emily Grattan started a sprint. The race to the wire between these two was most exciting and like the other heats brought everyone to their feet. Emily had a bit of the best of it while Singin' Sam, going his best race, was a close third, Fred Worthing almost matching strides with him fourth, Nita Volo fifth and Manchester Alberta sixth, time 2:20 1-4.

2:17 trot Purse \$400 Seven trotters took the word on

the fourth score to a good getaway with Ruby Volo out in front; Paul Abbe went to a bad break in the first turn losing a job of ground. Beaverdale, a brother of Harvest Melody who also made a losing break. Getting back on the trot Paul Abbe made up ground at a surprising clip and back fifth horse to the end of the stretch passed George Mac and Hillside Scot and was only a few feet back of Ruby Volo who finished a short head from the winner. Scotty Watson, who came through the stretch well driven by Earl Semple to head the game little Ruby Volo driven by Earl's father, Tyndall Semple. This was just one of several battles father and son have had at this meet—the fortunes of war resting with one then with the other. George Mac was fifth, Harvest Melody sixth, Beaverdale seventh, all trotters finishing well, Time 2:15.

Second Heat. This was one of the best heats which featured the fastest of the race. Ruby Volo, the first four horses being of the blanket variety. Paul Abbe breaking the first turn recovered, lost ground but came through the back stretch flying to a nice-and-lose finish with Scotty Watson but Scotty had a shade the best of it. Driver Power's great drive earned for him a great hand from his admirers. Ruby Volo third and Hillside Scot were so close on the leaders that it took quick work by the judges to call off their number. Ruby Volo, Harvest Melody and Beaverdale finished in that order close up, Time 2:14.

Third Heat. They got away on the second score with Scotty Watson last horse as he had to take last horse position. His driver took things very easy apparently intent with winning the race and saving his horse who had also won the previous day. Almost to the wire to the finish, a truly fighting one in which Hillside Scot came through amid the cheers of hundreds of friends as Johnny Conroy, Ruby Volo was beaten out by inches and the game little Harvest Melody, who so electrified Exhibition crowds six years ago when he won two of the fast trots on the program and equalled the track record, finished third. Paul Abbe had actually finished in second place, but because of breaks the judges set him back to fourth; George Mac fifth, Beaverdale sixth, Scotty Watson seventh. Scotty Watson was back almost to the wire when the leaders reached the wire and he evidently thinking the races had all rounded the turn jumped on the track. Scotty's sulky struck him from behind and he landed in his arm. A large crowd gathered quickly but the Mounties had the situation in hand and took the boy to hospital. Driver Earl Semple felt very badly but was assured that it was entirely the boy's fault, Time 2:15 3/4.

### 2:16 trot and pace

This race furnished the biggest upset in the Maritime racing annals this season—why? Simply because Oliver Grattan had not been even a serious contender in any of his starts ever against horses of very much lighter caliber than the field he started in yesterday. True there were some that had faith in him and one was owned by C. L. Dauphine of Dartmouth, N.S., who believed that Tyndall Semple could turn the trick for him. Tyndall's racing mind was on the money and he had in the Maritimes prior to yesterday.

First heat. They got away with very little scoring to a good start. It was a close battle with the high-spirited San Ton springing for the lead. Usclita Britton got out in the clear in the race for home shaking off a great drive by San Ton's young Conroy. Hal McKinney and Oliver Grattan finished very close up—in fact the first four horses were lined across the track, Major Bowes and Playdale fifth, Time 2:12 1/2.

Second heat. They got away on the second score to a good start, Usclita Britton was at the rail but San Ton took the lead past the half closely followed by Oliver Grattan, then Oliver got in the clear at the three-quarter pole with San Ton second and Usclita Britton third. Then things began to happen away back trotter Playdale, showing Grand Circuit form, began to speed up the pacer, like nobody's business. He was really driving a steady race and the stretch back in fifth position. He tore past Major Bowes, Hal McKinney, Usclita Britton and San Ton and was at Oliver's pads when they crossed the finish line. Time 2:10 1/2.

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—(AP)—Lefty Larry French, the National League's leading pitcher, blanked Philadelphia Phils at Brooklyn today on four hits to hang up his 12th victory against only one defeat as Brooklyn Dodgers squeezed out a 1-0 decision.

The triumph was something of a gift from French's opponent, Ruben Melton, who matched the Brooklyn southpaw's four-hit performance by forcing in the winning run in the ninth inning when he walked Dolph Camilli with the bases loaded.

### Cards Win Bill From Cubs

At Chicago, St. Louis Cardinals took both ends of a doubleheader from the Cubs 9-4 and 8-3 before a crowd of 14,127. Johnny Beazley turned in his 13th victory of the season in the opener.

### Braves Whip Giants Twice

At Boston, the Braves snapped a five-game winning streak for New York Giants, shutting them out 1-0 in the opener of a doubleheader and then burying them 8-2 under an 18-hit attack in the nightcap.

## 'Triple - header' Punch party in Garden tonight

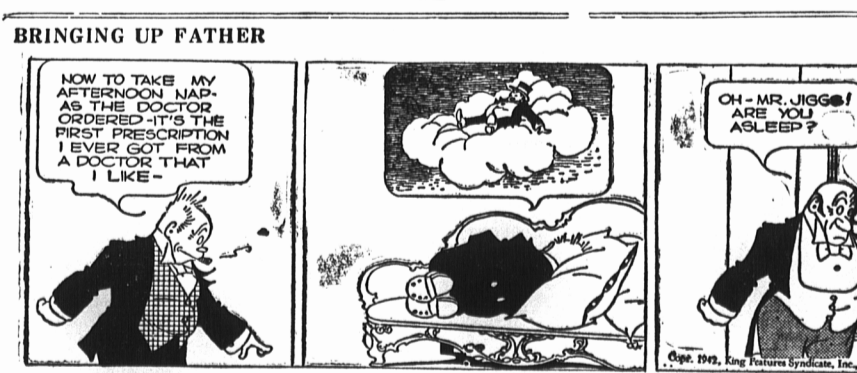
